Going Overseas



Miss Madelyn Clarkin (above), daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. P. W. Clarkin, has been granted leave by the City School Board to become one of a group of 100 teachers from all Canada selected by the Department of National Defence to teach the children of Canadian service men at the seven Canadian bases in France and Germany. Miss Clarkin is Grade II teacher at Queen Square School.

The teachers will live in quarters provided by the Department of National Defence and enjoy a status equal to that of captain in the army. The period of employment is for two years, with the option of an extension if so desired. Pension and other benefits enjoyed under local employment will be continued during the absence overseas. The party leaves for Europe in mid-August to take over the schools, four of which are now being built at the RCAF bases at Metz and Gros Tenquin in France and Zweibruecken in Germany. Three schools are being erected in Soest, Germany, headquarters of the First Canadian Infantry Brigade.
