TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] A Dastardly Attack. ST. ANDREW'S, Nov. 16. Last evening, as the wife of Mr. John Barton, Baker, was proceeding from her residence, on Water Street, to that of her son, she was attacked on the corner of Queen and Frederick Streets by a drunken man, who knocked her down and kicked her about the body, and knelt on her prostrate form, pounding it with both fists and knees. The night being dark, cold and stormy, and it being supper hour, the streets were deserted and her cries were not heard. She finally made her escape and succeeded in reaching her home. On entering the house she swooned away, consequently some minutes had elapsed before she was able to explain what had befallen her. Search was at once made for her hat and shawl, which together with the hat of her assailant were found at the scene of the outrage. The owner of the hat is known and is one Graham, a painter, whom it is said Mr. Buxton will prosecute. It is to be hoped that such an example will be made of him as shall forever deter any one else from perpetrating such a dastardly act. Excitement in Ottawa. OTTAWA, Nov. 16. There was great excitement here this morning on the announcement of the dissolution of the Ontario Legislature. It appears to have been a sudden resolve on the part of Mowat, and surprised his supporters quite as much as his opponents. It is generally thought here to indicate weakness on the part of Mowat. He knows the Dominion elections will result, in Ontario, in the return of Sir John's Government by an increased majority, and fears the result would be his own defeat if the Provincial follows the Dominion elections. A Caucus. QUEBEC, Nov. 16. A caucus of prominent National Conservatives was held yesterday afternoon at the St. Louis Hotel. After sitting for about two hours the meeting adjourned till the evening, when another session was held. It is understood that the caucus occupied itself with Provincial matters, and decided to rigidly adhere to the programme laid down by *Le Devoir* and *La Justice* respecting Nationalist opposition to any administration not avowedly hostile to the Federal Government. Seized and Released. ST. ANDREW'S, Nov. 16. The Dominion cruiser Gen. Middleton arrived here to-day. On Friday she seized four Eastport fishing vessels, a schooner and three sloop-rigged boats, for violation of the customs regulations. The fact of the seizure was by Capt. McLean wired to Ottawa, and he received orders to release the boats upon their owners depositing \$20 for each boat. The deposits were made and the boats released. A Compulsory Reduction. ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 16. The Russian State commission on the sugar industry have, by a vote of 12 to 4, agreed to recommend to the Government the compulsory reduction of the sugar production of the Empire, in order to improve the trade in it. It is believed, however, that the Czar will decide in favor of the minority of the committee who oppose restrictions in any way. The Dominion Elections. OTTAWA, Nov. 16. Some shrewd politicians here are advocating the Dominion elections being held the same day (Dec. 29th) as the Ontario local elections, while others hold there is no necessity for the Dominion elections till after another session of Parliament. The Stockyard Strike. CHICAGO, Nov. 16. Everything was quiet in the stock yards to-day, and a large number of the strikers returned to work. The militia will be withdrawn to-morrow, as it is now thought that the civil authorities will be able to preserve order. Lord Salisbury's Movements. LONDON, Nov. 16. Lord Salisbury will spend Sunday at Hatfield House in Hertfordshire, notwithstanding the demand of the Social Democratic Federation that he remain in London in order to receive a deputation of workmen. Early in the Field. OTTAWA, Nov. 16. Mr. Perley, lumberman, issues a card to-night announcing himself a candidate for Ottawa in the Dominion Commons, but it is no way an indication of the Dominion elections being held at an early date. Fast Time. ST. THOMAS, Ont. 16. To-day a Michigan Central train on the Canadian Southern division, having aboard some of the directors and officials, run from St. Clair Junction to Windsor Dock, 107 miles, in 96 minutes. The Ontario Elections. OTTAWA, Nov. 16. The announcement of the dissolution of the Ontario Legislature, has taken all parties by surprise. It is thought that the elections will be brought on before the New Year. Ten Men Killed. PARIS, Nov. 16. Ten workmen were instantly killed to-day, and six others injured by the collapse of a building in process of erection in Gravelle department of Isere.

A Big Verdict.

NEW YORK, Nov. 16. Mrs. Ferry to-day got a verdict of \$10,000 against the Manhattan Elevated Railway, for injuries caused by the premature starting of a train.

A \$500,000 Blaze.

DUNHAM, S. C., Nov. 16. A large part of the business section of this town was burned early this morning. The loss is \$500,000.
