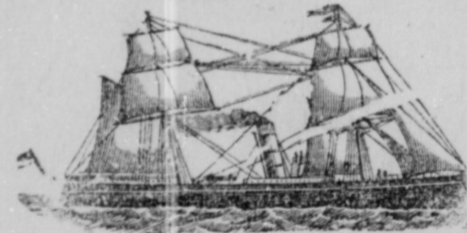

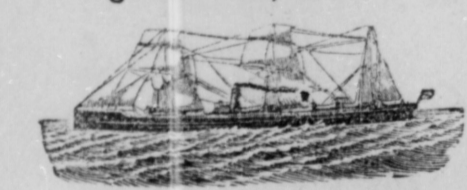

### The Transvaal War

The Biggest British Army Sent Abroad.

It has been officially stated that General Sir Redvers Buller, V. C., will have under his command during the present war in the Transvaal no fewer than 70,000 British troops. This, says Pearson's Weekly, is probably the largest number of men ever placed, at one time under the supreme control of one leader, viewing the fighting strength of the British army (Europeans) in the great wars of comparatively modern times.

At Waterloo the Duke of Wellington had just fewer than 24,000 British troops under his command, while Lord Raglan, in the Crimea, never had more at one time than 26,000 Britishers fighting under him. In the Indian mutiny Lord Clyde (then Sir Colin Campbell) had but 40,000 troops, with whose assistance and the help of that portion of the Indian army which remained faithful to its allegiance he was enabled to quell the most serious outbreak of modern times.

Going a little further back, to the time of the great and prolonged Peninsular war, Wellington thought he was a fortunate man if he could direct an army corps of 30,000 British troops, while the great Marlborough, at Blenheim, led to victory, and against fearful odds, an army of 16,000 strong.

Lord Wolseley was expected, in the Egyptian war of 1885, to scatter the forces of the Mahdi, a very considerable force consisting of over 50,000 Arabs, and to assume the practical dictatorship of the Soudan, with a British force of only 30,000 men while Lord "Bobs," as the hero of Candahar is playfully called, that is to say Lord Roberts, could rely on no more than 13,000 European troops to oppose the forces of the then turbulent Ameer of Afghanistan in the Afghan war of 1874 Sir Redvers Buller is therefore an exceedingly fortunate man in finding himself at the head of a fighting army whose numbers exceed by 2,000 the total allied forces which Wellington commanded at Waterloo.

A Harrismith Briton, who was commandeered stained himself Kafir color, clothed himself in an old blanket, and put himself in charge of a native who brought him safely to Besters Station, Underberg. It was a two night's walk, avoiding roads and frequented paths, a distance of over 50 miles.

The London Chronicle, having related a dramatic story of Freemasonry on Majuba Hill, a past master writes to that journal as follows: "Many similar touching incidents occurred during the Franco-German war. Not only are President Kruger and Joubert enthusiastic Freemasons, but practically every educated Boer belongs to the order. As most of the British officers also belong to the craft, it will be a real case of 'brothers slaying brothers.' During the last Transvaal war an appeal was sent by the grand orient of the Netherlands to the M. W. G. M. the Prince of Wales, entreating him, as a 'brother,' to use his influence in favor of peace. The Prince replied that, as this was a political question, he could not intervene."

tinued the Dundee man "that's nothing to the new kind of dynamite called sleepite. When these shells go off every burgher within a two-mile radius falls fast asleep from the gas. The roobairies come along, take away your guns, tie you up in couples, and walk off singing 'Rule Britannia.'" "Magtig!" again exclaimed the Boer, "de verdomde Eenglesche is wonderlyke voor inventie!" Then he went off a cross the Buffalo and told his friends that Englishmen who resided for long in South Africa were bigger liars than even the Boers themselves.

Proofs are not wanting that the noisy implacables who are making disloyal utterances in Ireland at present are but a very small minority of the Irish people. The approving cheers which greeted the passage in Mr. Edward Blake's speech to his constituents of South Longford when he praised the loyalty, devotion and heroism of the Irish soldiers in South Africa showed that the people there were not in sympathy with the irreconcilables. Irish regiments have a record for bravery not surpassed by any in the service. General Gatacre, on leaving for the Transvaal not long ago, said: "I am 'lucky in having five of my regiments 'Irish, for the knot that five Irish regiments cannot untie must be a 'difficult one. If a commanding officer 'in charge of five Irish regiments fails 'he must be a bad specimen, for if you 'handle Irishmen in the right way 'there is nothing on the face of the 'earth they will not do.' Ireland was never so prosperous and contented as it is to-day. The trade of agitation has, therefore, fallen low in popular favor and ceased to be as lucrative as it once was. When people are doing well, in Ireland as elsewhere, they are not inclined to quarrel with their bread and butter."—Montreal Witness.
