

# Cerebral Palsy Meeting Is Held At The Centre

Plans were made for the tag day to be held this year on October 25th and 26th. The Beta Sigma Phi Sorority group volunteered to solicit the business firms for donations to tag day. A special meeting is to be held at a later date to make final arrangements for tag day. Lunch was served by committee in charge.

# Guy Molle Drafted To Try To Form New French Gov't

PARIS (AP) — Socialist Guy Molle, who set a post-war record by holding the premier's office for 15 months, was virtually drafted by President Rene Coty Friday to try to form a new government. He said neither yes nor no when asked to be premier, but promised the president to see what support he could rally. He will not give a definite answer until Sunday. He does not think much of his prospects. He told reporters he does not think it will be possible to form a cabinet and said he finally agreed to try only on the president's insistence. Coty took action on the fourth day of the crisis, which broke Monday when Premier Maurice Bourges-Maunoury was defeated on his Algerian home rule bill. Since the two previous crises have been provoked by the centre groups in the National Assembly, Molle sought assurances of their support before agreeing to move ahead. There was little chance he would get it. The socialists' own minimum program provides for a second attempt to pass the Algeria bill which defeated Bourges-Maunoury.

# 14 Years For Killing Wife

BADDECK, N.S. (CP)—Daniel Morrison, 65, was sentenced to 14 years in penitentiary when his second trial on a charge of murdering his wife ended in a manslaughter conviction here Friday. He was charged with murder last spring after his wife's body was found hanging in the stairway of their farmhouse at Baddeck Forks. The bald carpenter and woodsman munched loaves continually during the re-trial. He had been sentenced to death in June, but was granted another trial by the Nova Scotia Supreme Court. He displayed the same calm when the sentence was announced Friday that he has shown since his wife's death. Judge Eugene L. Parker termed the death of the former Halifax and Sydney woman, whom Morrison met through a lonely hearts club, "a most re-

volting episode." Only Morrison's age, Judge Parker said, kept him from imposing the maximum of life imprisonment. The defence pleaded for leniency in view of Morrison's military record. He served in both world wars and had no previous criminal record.

# State Of Siege In Argentina

BUENOS AIRES (Reuters)—A state of siege was proclaimed Friday in Argentina. The move followed reports of a split in the cabinet of President Pedro Aramburu. The reported split follows a period of extensive labor unrest over the rising cost of living, culminating in a series of strikes, and a government statement rejecting the idea of any large-scale wage increases. SOUTHERN REPUBLIC Uruguay, the smallest republic in South America, covers an area of 72,153 square miles.

# All Quiet At Little Rock

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP)—The white student body of Central High School Friday quietly admitted nine Negroes into their midst for a 10th day of integrate education. Gone were the outward signs of teen-aged restlessness that built up all week and reached a climax in Thursday's walkout of 75 students. The demonstrators were suspended for three days. Nevertheless, attendance was reported at 1,725 out of the maximum 2,000, only 56 below Wednesday's peak figure. Sixteen rifle-carrying guardsmen escorted the nine Negroes half way across the campus Friday. There, four paratroopers in full combat gear and escorted the youngsters through the main entrance. As usual, about 100 white students lounged on the steps leading to the entrance, awaiting the opening class bell. Thursday and the day before, they booed and jeered the Negroes, and even sought mildly to block their entry. Friday, although three or four of the white children waved Confederate flags, there was no shouting.

# British Labor Conference Ends On Note Of Harmony

BRIGHTON, England (CP)—The Labor party conference which ended Friday has removed the last lingering hope in some Conservative circles that the Socialist movement would undermine its own election chances with internal bickering. The underlying impression was of an extraordinary lack of bitterness, even among the extreme left wing when it saw the conference endorse overwhelmingly a new, moderate approach to public ownership instead of full-scale nationalization. The conference also saw Hugh Gaitskell emerge with the full stature of party leader. It now is apparent the party is not only united but united largely on Gaitskell's own terms and own policies—an achievement many political observers believed impossible when the 51-year-old graduate of one of England's most exclusive private schools took the helm two years ago. DEFINITELY THE BOSS Henry Fairlie, political commentator of The Daily Mail, said that "by all standards this is a stupendous political achievement."

# Arrange New Talks To Avert Strike In Nfld.

OTTAWA (CP)—A revival of negotiations on the strike threat hanging over the CNR's Newfoundland ship service was arranged Friday by Labor Minister Michael Starr. The minister announced the publicly-owned CNR and the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees (CBRE) have agreed to resume talks with the help of a mediator he will appoint Monday. The CBRE, whose members are due to strike 16 ships Oct. 15, gave its assent to resumed negotiations late Friday through national president W. J. Smith of Ottawa. GORDON AGREED CNR President Donald Gordon, whose railway operates the ships in trust for the federal government, had agreed to new discussions at a meeting Thursday with Mr. Starr and Transport Minister George Hees, who reports to Parliament for the CNR.

# Big Fire Loss At Glenella, Man.

GLENELLA, Man. (CP)—The entire north side of the main street business district in the village of Glenella, except for a small barber shop, was destroyed by a fire early Friday. The wind-whipped fire, a repeat of a 1929 fire which wiped out the same section of the town, agency buildings, two stores containing the living quarters of two families, a warehouse and a lively stable. With no fire fighting equipment in the village 130 miles northwest of Winnipeg residents tumbled out of bed at 3:15 a.m. to fight a losing battle against the flames which broke out in Ramgren's general store and leap-frogged before stiff southeast winds along the entire northside of the main street. Cause of the fire and estimates of damage were not available. ter George Hees, who reports to Parliament for the CNR.

# Search Will Continue Today

HALIFAX (CP)—RCAF search and rescue officials said Friday night seven aircraft will continue the search today for 22-year-old navy pilot, Sub-Lt. Howard G. Cooper of Toronto, who ditched his Banshee jet fighter in the Atlantic Wednesday. Three navy ships, including the carrier Bonaventure, and nine air force and navy planes were called in at dusk Friday after an unsuccessful search that extended 200 miles south of Halifax. Sub-Lt. Cooper was on a 30-mile flight from the Bonaventure to Shearwater air base when he radioed he was ditching his plane. He did not say what the trouble was. His position was estimated at 10 miles south of Halifax.

# 80 Per Cent Of Grain Still Out In Peace River

EDMONTON (CP)—Eighty per cent of the grain is still in the fields in the big Peace River area where five inches of snow fell Thursday and the situation looks "pretty tough," A. M. Wilson, Alberta field crops commissioner, said Friday. Commenting on effect of the winter-like weather that has struck Alberta, he said most field crops have been harvested in southern Alberta and a good percentage in central areas, but "the Peace River area has been hit worst. "It looks bad at the moment," he said, "but if the snow melts, and the crop dries off, most can be picked up."
