

Free Legal Aid Proposed Before Bar Association

OTTAWA (CP)—A call to the Canadian legal profession to declare itself in favor of free legal aid to those who need it and can't afford it has been placed before the Canadian Bar Association's annual convention.

The proposal was received by the association council at a closed meeting Tuesday and will be printed for the more than 1,000 lawyers who are expected to gather today for the first of a series of open meetings lasting until Saturday.

The report from a committee headed by Benjamin R. Guss of Saint John, N. B., called on the CBA to declare that:

"The legal profession unequivocally undertakes to provide legal

advice or representation in court to all persons entitled to legal aid."

SET UP FUNDS

It recommended that provincial associations set up legal aid funds and committees to pass on applications for help.

The report also recommended that the Canadian Medical Association and National Associations of Surveyors and Engineers also be asked to provide free advice and expert witness in court cases where free legal aid is given.

The CBA council received the report and indications were that it may be revised in part before it is considered for adoption.

The council also passed on to the incoming executive, to be elected Saturday, the task of forming a committee to continue a study of the legal position of newspapers involved in libel or slander suits.

CHARTER OF LITTLE MAN

The legal-aid proposal called for establishment of a "charter of the little man to the Canadian courts of justice."

"We favor voluntary legal aid as against a government subsidized plan," the report said.

It suggested that if provincial legal-aid committees decide that an applicant cannot pay the full fee "the committee will refer the applicant to a competent lawyer who will render the service at a cost within the prospective client's means, so as not to impair the applicant's ability to support his family adequately."

PRESS PRIVILEGES

The "press privileges" committee recommended terms of reference for continued study of the position of newspapers in libel and slander suits.

The report was submitted by a committee headed by Paul P. Hutchison of Montreal, set up after the CBA's executive meeting last March at Montebello, Que.

Cecil W. Robinson of Hamilton, a member of the committee, said the examination "will be pursued with special reference to the restriction on the right of the public to have full knowledge of an access to the administration of justice."

When the press is barred from the courts "the situation needs scrutiny," Mr. Robinson said in an interview. "It may be a possible interference with the right of the man on the street to be aware of how justice is being handled."

Tourists Leave Mark In Parliament

OTTAWA (CP)—Tourists have left their mark on the parliament buildings this summer.

One has carved his name in letters two inches high and an eighth of an inch deep in the old stone in the main arch of the Peace Tower.

Fourteen pieces of wrought iron have been wrenched from the gates to the memorial chamber where the Canadian Book of Remembrance is kept.

The decorative wrought iron padlock to the Memorial Chamber gates has disappeared altogether.

Atop the Peace Tower, stone carvers have scratched, gouged and ground initials into the balcony under the clock.

OTTAWA (CP)—Women have invaded another male domain—bellringing.

Several of the 40-odd delegates attending the annual congress here of the Guild of Carillonners in North America are proving that playing a carillon no longer is reserved for men.

Ottillie L. Timblin, a slim, 25-year-old blonde from Rockford, Ill., gave 20-minute recital Tuesday on the huge 53-bell carillon in the Peace Tower on Parliament Hill.

Miss Timblin said the most suitable attire for a woman carillonneur is slacks or pedal-pushers and flat-heeled leather shoes.

One of the women delegates is Sister Ruth Magdalene of San Mateo, Calif. She had been scheduled to give a recital but later decided not to play.

Two other delegates, Beverly Brehem of Ann Arbor, Mich., and Julia Hollyer of Detroit, also are scheduled to give recitals on the carillon in the Peace Tower.

NEW YORK (AP)—A strike of 35,000 non-operating employees of the Pennsylvania Railroad was called Wednesday for 12:01 a. m. Saturday. The employees maintain and inspect equipment in 13 states.

The Transport Workers Union of America (CIO) announced at a meeting here its railroad division called the strike on recommendation of a Philadelphia conference Aug. 11.

Michael J. Quill, TWU president, said "countless grievances" were the cause of the strike action.
