DURING the week ending Sept 13, 853 head of cattle and 1018 sheep were shipped from Montreal.

THE hull and machinery of the steamer State of Virginia was sold on Thursday last for \$405.

TIGNISH ELECTION.—We learn that S. F. Perry, Esq., was elected to fill the vacancy in the First District of Prince County.

It is said that a grand banquet is to be tendered Sir John A. Macdonald at Quebec on his arrival there from England, also, that a demonstration in his honor is to be made at Ottawa on his return.

A TELEGRAM from Winnipeg states that Mr. Thomas White, M. P., and Mr. C. J. Bridges, Chief Commissioner of the Hudson Bay Company, returned to that city on Monday night last, after a trip to the Rocky Mountains.

AT THE Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this morning, John Smith, drunk and sleeping on the Park Road, was fined \$1 or 4 days. John McAdam, drunk and incapable, was fined \$1 or 4 days.

THE late William S. O'Brien, one of the earliest and most opulent of the Bonanza magnates, left an estate of \$9,000,000. Each of his nieces, nephews and sisters will receive \$300,000 and his brother will receive \$375,000.

YESTERDAY the diver—who arrived to assist in removing the hull of the "Emigrant"—recovered a quantity of goods from the dock between Peake's wharves—which was lost some time ago while discharging the "Prince Edward."

PROF. ANDERSON'S entertainment last evening, was attended by a large—and a wholly disappointed audience. It was in all respects a failure—few parts of the programme being carried out, and these few were botched. The people of Charlottetown will, hereafter, we hope, be on their guard for such imposters as this professor.

THE Monetary "Times" reasons itself into the belief that the Canadian timber trade will not have to meet with undue competition from the North of Europe for some time. It is under the impression that the lumber production this year in those countries is low, owing to the long depression in the leading lumber markets in Europe.

SAMUEL J. TILDEN, of New York, having been taken to task in some of the papers for alleged violation of a private agreement with Cyrus W. Field, through selling some shares of stock, defends himself by stating that he was actuated by a "desire to limit the area exposed to possible conflagration by financial pyrotechnics. A very neat and clever way of putting it.

THE Rev. Father Doyle, Parish Priest of this town, takes his departure this morning for the United States, for an extended collecting tour. Since the commencement of the Parish Church, the congregation have had to struggle with many great difficulties, and we sincerely hope that he will meet with that good success which he so richly deserves.—S. Journal.

THE Pictou Standard says that every coal mine in Pictou County is now raising all the coal possible, and every miner has all the employment he wants; that the miners have had so much work this summer they are now taking matters easy, and indulge in a few holidays each month, which the managers unwillingly concede, and that the prospects for large shipments this fall are very good. And, this the Standard claims, is due to the change of tariff. The Halifax Chronicle on the other hand says that the coal trade of Nova Scotia has been injured by the new policy.

It is said that the true version of the George Washington "hatchet" story has lately come to light, in the confession of a colored woman, who recently died at the reputed age of 125 years, who claimed a friendship with the nurse of said George. It was really the old woman who did the cutting, but George had so strong a love for his "mammy" that, with boyish frankness, he honorably did "misrepresent," and privately received the punishment himself, which was faithfully administered by the irate but loving father.

THE New York Post says: "The total importation of gold from the beginning of August to the 12th September amounts to 19,650,763, and silver \$529,424, making the aggregate of the two metals \$20,290,187. The banks have already gained enough of this to effect the withdrawals of money into the Treasury in connection with settlement for the Syndicate subscriptions for four per cents; and yet the banks have, since the middle of August, lost \$18,400,000 of cash. The inference is not far from \$2,000,000 of currency have been called from this city to the interior within the last six weeks.

YELLOW FEVER.—On Thursday morning the brig "Woodcock" arrived at Halifax from Porto Rico after a voyage of twenty days, having left San Juan on the 28th August. The captain reports that three of the hands died of yellow fever. Otto Fisher, 21 years of age, a native of Settlin, Prussia, was the first victim. He died while the vessel was lying at San Juan, P. R. The other two died at Humacao, P. R. Their names are Robert Wake and Peter Gallant, the former a native of Sunderland, England, aged 22 years; the other is a native of P. E. Island, aged 25. The rest of the ship's company escaped the disease entirely. The captain reports that on the 8th inst., in lat. 29 42 N., long. 63 08 W., passed the schooner "Lizzie Tupper," steering S. W.—Halifax Herald.
