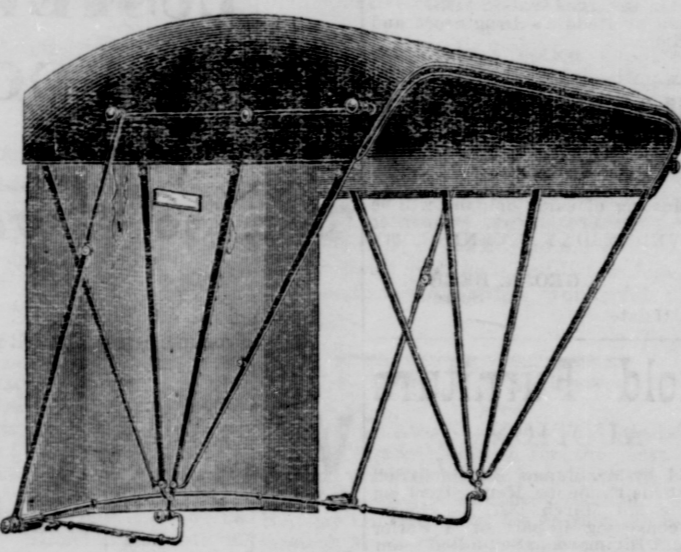

In the Absence of Scales.

One and one-third pints of powdered sugar weigh one pound.

Two and three-fourths teaspoons (level) of powdered sugar weigh one pound.

One pint (heaped) of granulated sugar weighs fourteen ounces.

Two teaspoons (level) of granulated sugar weigh one pound.

One pint of coffee "A" sugar weighs twelve ounces.

Two teaspoons (well heaped) of coffee "A" sugar weigh one pound.

One pint of best brown sugar weighs thirteen ounces.

Two and one-half teaspoons (level) of best brown sugar weigh one pound.

One tablespoon (well heaped) of granulated coffee "A" or best brown sugar equals one ounce.

Two tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar or flour weigh one ounce.

One tablespoonful (well rounded) of soft butter weighs one ounce.

Soft butter the size of an egg weighs one ounce.

One quart of sifted flour (well heaped) weighs one pound.

Two teaspoons of soft butter well packed weigh one pound.

Miss Parloa says one generous pint of liquid or one pint of finely chopped meat packed solidly weighs one pound, which it would be very convenient to remember.

Teaspoons vary in size, and the new ones hold about twice as much as an old-fashioned spoon of thirty years ago. A medium-sized teaspoon contains about a drachm.

Four teaspoons are equal to one table-spoon.

A Millionaire's Death.

A Port Elgin, Ont., despatch says that Detective McGowan and Constable Heffernan on Tuesday arrested James Key and Henry Raymond on a warrant charging them with the slaying of Wm. Webster, the Chicago millionaire, at Burgoyne. Keys kept a hotel in a small village in Bruce Co., Ontario, and Webster was placed in his charge by some Chicago friends. It is supposed during the two or three days he was absent from this escapade he met with the wound from the effects of which he died. While Webster was away Keys sent and informed his son from Chicago of the matter, and the son hired Raymond to assist in capturing and looking after his father. The wound festered and Webster is stated to have been eaten alive by vermin. The prisoners were taken to Walkerton to appear before the magistrate. McGowan will ask for remand in order to produce witnesses, of which there are supposed to be about a dozen. He says the evidence he can produce will be sensational and revolting.

Maud S.

Mr. Joseph Harker, who bought Maud S., when she was only four years old, for the late William H. Vanderbilt, says the *Turf, Field and Farm*, has just offered Mr. Bonner, on behalf of a gentleman of wealth, \$100,000 in cash for the Queen. Mr. Bonner paid Mr. Vanderbilt \$40,000 for Maud S.; but she was lame the day she was delivered at Mr. Bonner's stable. Mr. Bonner, however, shod her so as to relieve her of her lameness, and since then she has twice beaten her record, having lowered it to 2:08. Now he is offered \$100,000 for the peerless mare, so that he would make \$60,000 profit if he should dispose of her—a pretty large sum for shoeing a horse. But Mr. Bonner refuses to sell Maud S. at any price.

A Great Ball Tossing.

The Boston Base Ball Club has purchased the release of Michael J. Kelly from the Chicago Club, paying therefor \$10,000, and on Monday that player was signed by Treasurer Billings of the Boston Club for the season of 1887. Kelly is considered by many the greatest ball tosser in the country, with but few equals as a general player. There is scarcely a position in the nine that he cannot fill. His home position is right field, and here he covers a wonderful amount of territory. He has filled the position of catcher with the most pronounced success, being quick as a cat, and his throwing to bases very fine. But it is as a base runner that he has won the greatest fame. He will receive \$5,000 a year.

A Straw House.

America's latest and most novel idea is a straw house. At the forthcoming American exhibition, which is to open May 2 at Earl's Court, Kensington, will be a house of straw, now being made in Philadelphia. This house is an American suburban villa, very handsome and thoroughly artistic in design, two and a half storeys high, and covering a space of 42 by 50 feet. It is built entirely of materials manufactured by straw, foundations, timber, flooring, sheathing, roofing—everything in fact, including the chimney—the material being fireproof. The inside finish will be in imitation rosewood, mahogany, walnut, maple, ash, ebony and other fine woods, the straw lumber taking perfectly well the surface and color of the desired grain.—*Gulliver's Magazine*.

A City of Champagne.

Epernay, in France, is a vast subterranean city of champagne. For miles and miles there are streets hewn out of the solid chalk, flanked with piles of bottles of champagne of all blends and qualities. There is no light in this labyrinth of streets crossings and turnings, except what the spluttering candles afford. All is dark, dank and damp, with the temperature away down about zero. The largest champagne cellars cover 45 acres, and contain five million bottles of wine. There is a whole street in Epernay lined with fine chateaux, all owned by champagne men.
