A committee composed of Councillor C. J. Steele as chairman, Mayor Henry W. Wedge, Councillor H. E. Clark and John E. Cameron, town clerk was appointed to conduct the affairs of the Civic Stadium for the season 1953-54 at a special meeting of the Summerside Town Council last evening.

The meeting was called to consider the balance of unpaid bills which were approved to be paid and also to hear an up to date report on the Civic Stadium which was given by Councillor Steele.

Mayor Wedge explained that the committee that will conduct the affairs of the stadium was appointed to facilitate the solution of smaller problems that will arise from time to time without having to bring these matters before the whole council. If the committee fails to agree on some matter it will then be brought before the council for solution. Mayor Wedge also said that the committee members could be changed by action of the council at any time.

Councillor Steele gave a glowing report of the large number of adults and young people who already have taken advantage of the modern ice plant and of the complimentary remarks passed by many of them. In his report he said that on December 28th over 500 paid admissions in the afternoon and 465 in the evening. Councillor Steele stated that the plumbing and heating installation will be completed in a day or two and that the carpenters and painters are nearly finished with their work. He said if any additional employees were needed to operate the stadium they would be paid at the rate of 75 cents an hour.

Councillor MacDougall reported that he had been approached on occasions by town employees and others regarding pay increases to some employees and on further checking had found some increases had been put through by committee chairmen without authorization of the council. Councillor MacDougall asked that the council be supplied with a list of all overtime pay received by town employees in order that this matter be reviewed at the next meeting.

Mayor Wedge informed the council members that any pay increases are to be brought before the council for approval at the next meeting and a list of employees who received overtime pay would be supplied at that time. He said the council is responsible for all the money paid in by tax payers and that pay increases would have to be approved by them and not by committee chairmen.

In his report Councillor Clark said over 1,070 communications on the North American continent have been received in their water supply and asked that the matter be considered further in regard to Summerside. He asked if a letter from the Home and School Association relating to this had been received and was informed by the town clerk that no letter from this organization had, to his knowledge, been received.

Mayor Henry Wedge presided with all councillors present with the exception of Councillor Jenkins.—S.

Trimble Signs 1-Year Contract With Ti-Cats

HAMILTON (CP)—Jim Trimble, former head coach of Philadelphia Eagles of the National Football League, has been signed to a one-year contract to coach Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the Big Four football league.

Hamilton said Thursday the 34-year-old former lineman signed the contract Wednesday night in New York with Jim Gaudreau, newly-appointed general manager of the Tiger-Cats.

Financial details were not announced.

Trimble was released by Eagles two weeks ago because of what he termed was the poor showing the team made this year. Picked in pre-season estimates as the club to beat, Eagles won only four of 12 games.

SCOUTING TRIP

Trimble left New York immediately after the signing to look at prospective new players for his team. His plans to scout the Orange Bowl game at Miami New Year's Day and is arranging to get reports on players in other bowl games.

He replaces Carl Voyles at the Tiger-Cat helm. Voyles, who quit three weeks ago to accept a coaching job with a Toronto financier, coached the team six years. He never missed the playoffs and won one Grey Cup.

Trimble visited Hamilton Tuesday and looked at movies of last year's team in action. He said he is impressed with the calibre of Canadian football.

Pittsburgh Steelers of the NFL were reported trying to sign him as assistant coach. Several colleges also were seeking his services, and one offered him a five-year contract.

Five Canadian Colleges Give Players To Draft

OTTAWA (CP) - Five eastern Canada colleges have contributed 37 players to the proposed first national professional football draft it was learned Thursday.

The list of college players who will graduate next spring has been circulated to all nine pro clubs who will meet in Winnipeg Jan. 19-22 to decide, among other things, their draft choices.

The mechanics of the draft have not been set, but informants said there has been a suggestion that the last place team of the league whose champion lost in the Grey Cup final last Nov. 26 would get first choice.

RIDERS FIRST CHOICE

This would give Ottawa Rough Riders of the Big Four Football Union first pick since Montreal Alouettes, the Big Four champions were beaten in the Grey Cup final by Edmonton Eskimos of the Western Interprovincial Football Union.

If this system is adopted, second choice, possibly would go to Calgary Stampeders, last place club in the WIFU, third to Toronto Argonauts which finished third in the Big Four, with succeeding selections alternating between West and East.

The college draft was started by the Big Four a few years ago but was not recognized by the western league. Thus, western teams could—and did—outbid eastern clubs for players on the draft list.
