betic society which is composed of lay and physician membership.

In what way can these diabetic societies help the diabetic and strengthen their own association? The objectives of the Canadian Diabetic Association are built around five main points:

First, the identification of diabetics and their registration through membership in the provincial associations which are to be affiliated with and coordinated by the national organization. Secondly, the education of the diabetic and his family on matters of general importance to this group. It is continually stressed that patients must consult their own doctor regularly and it has been found that physicians receive much cooperation from patients and family as a result of this educational activity. Thirdly, the association hopes to assist medical research in the field of diabetes and to cooperate in every possible way with research workers. Fourthly, it is hoped to provide certain services for diabetics — camps for children, diabetic diets in restaurants and in shopping centers. Finally, this important group of nearly two hundred thousand Canadians may be heard more readily when they approach governments and employers.

Paintings By Halifax Artists Showing At P.W.C.

A collection of 20 paintings by a young Halifax artist, Patricia Ann McCurdy, is showing this week at Prince of Wales College, sponsored by the College Art Department.

The showing is interesting for the imaginative and fresh qualities in some of the paintings which vary from landscapes to a semi-abstract fantasy.

Two canvases, "Calendulas" and "Flowers" were done with palette knife to achieve a rather stimulating bold effect. In contrast, are her water colors, such as "Island Bayberries," done with small, deft strokes and almost Oriental in effect.

Three perspectives of buildings in "Old Houses, Villefranche" make up an interesting study. "Clowns," "Clowns, too," with its extraordinary effect produced by a close-up portrait of a clown's face, against a background of two animated figures against a black surface.

"Apple Trees and Barns" has a delightful pattern created by apple tree branches. It contrasts with a semi-abstract landscape in which the trees are unadorned and simply reach upward. It is a thoughtful picture, although lacking in subtler color tones.

A graduate from Mount Allison School of Fine Arts Miss McCurdy studied under Lauren Harris, Jr., and Alex Colville, both well known artists. The influence of the work of Lauren Harris, Sr., was noted in a painting such as "Peggy's Cove". The artist also trained at a Boston School of Art,

as well as the Nova Scotia School of Art where she won three scholarships.

Final showing will be made this afternoon and evening in room 66, at the college.

CHOCOLATE CHIFFON PIE

Soften: 1 envelope Knox Gelatine in: ¼ cup cold water in top of double boiler; Combine: ½ cup water 6 tablespoons Fry's Breakfast Cocoa ½ cup sugar ¼ teaspoon salt.

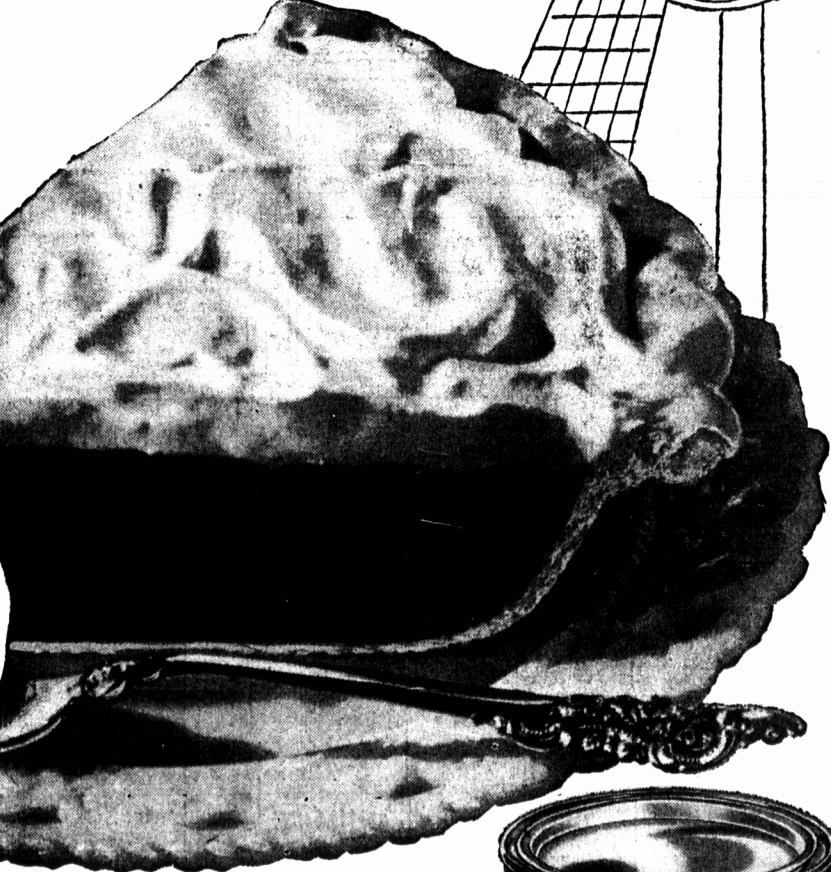
