ST. PATRICK'S DAY.

As the Festival of St. Patrick, Ireland's Patron Saint, fell upon Sunday this year, it is being celebrated to-day by the members of the Benevolent Irish Society. At 9.45 o'clock, in the midst of a blinding snowstorm, the members of that Society formed in line in front of their hall and headed by Chief Marshal Ronaghan and the Citizens' Band, started for St. Dunstan's Cathedral. The route was along Prince Street to Grafton, up Grafton to Queen, down Queen to Dorchester, and up Dorchester to the Cathedral. At the Cathedral High Mass was celebrated by Father Reid, Fathers McDougall and Hogan acting as deacon and sub-deacon respectively; and an able and eloquent sermon was preached by Rev. Dr. Morrison, Rector of St. Dunstan's College. There was a large congregation present. After Mass the procession was re-formed on Great George Street, and the Society returned to their hall by way of Great George, Water and Prince Streets. At the hall an address appropriate to the occasion was delivered by E. Honor, Lieutenant-Governor Howland, who joined the procession after the service at the church. At the conclusion of his address His Honor was enthusiastically cheered. The earnest was very creditable to the Benevolent Irish Society, an institution that has done a great deal of good for the poor of this city. The streets along which the procession passed were well filled with spectators. The unfavorable weather, however, prevented the traversing of the route originally mapped out. The celebration will be brought to a close with a dramatic entertainment at the Lyceum and a banquet at the Hotel Davies, both under the auspices of the Benevolent Irish Society. For each of these events the fullest preparation has been made, and a pleasant evening is assured all who assist at the functions. The entertainment which was to have been given at Emerald to-night has been postponed on account of the storm. It will take place on Tuesday evening, 23rd inst.
