### THE CARNIVAL OF NATIONS.

It was a large and fashionable audience which assembled at the Opera House last evening when "The Carnival of Nations" was produced under the direction of Professor McQuarrie assisted by Miss Helena Macdonald and her pupils, and everyone was delighted with the entertainment furnished. From the opening number—a National Drill participated in by some forty young people of both sexes appropriately costumed and bearing various flags—to the cake walk at the close, the performers held the undivided attention of the audience. All the dances were performed with an ease and grace indicating thorough training and the grouping of the various characters participating was very artistic. The programme included the Highland Fling, Sword dance, Spanish dance, Japanese dance, Irish jig, Dutch clog and the stately minuet,—for all of which Vinnicombe's orchestra, with Miss Lottie Balloran at the piano, furnished excellent music. Miss Helena Macdonald and Professor McQuarrie each exhibited superior skill in their individual performances. The little ones also danced exceptionally well; and the minuet, danced in colonial costume, was an exceedingly pretty feature. The dancing of the Dutch clog and the Irish jig, was also good;—but when all did so well it would hardly be fair to single out any for special mention. Six couples took part in the burlesque cake walk at the close—the cake being awarded to Mr. Peter Jackson and Miss Georgie Lightfoot (Mr. Cyrus Clarke and Mr. Jack Davies) who received the most applause. During the evening Professor McQuarrie and Miss Annie Murphy played a banjo duet, "Phantom Serenade," with much skill, and received well merited applause. The performance will be repeated tonight when a large audience is expected. Those who wish to pass an enjoyable evening should make a point of attending.
