## Meeting Ponders Smoking

OTTAWA (CP)—The federal government and eight of the 10 provinces are convinced there is a proven relationship between cigarette smoking and the mounting death toll from lung cancer, Health Minister LaMarsh reported Monday night.

Sponsored by the federal government, the conference is attended by representatives of all provinces except Quebec as well as spokesmen for the tobacco industry, doctors, cancer experts and others.

She told reporters that the conference will turn today to the problem of what to do about the health hazard posed by cigarette smoking.

And she indicated that the main decision will be in favor of a nationwide federal-provincial education campaign to persuade teenagers and pre-teens to stop smoking.

LAWS NOT ANSWER  
Strict legislation, she said, was not viewed as the answer to the problem.

There was a suggestion at the conference—apparently not accepted—that each province should publicize hazards to draw attention to the danger of cigarettes.
