MAPUS has been recognized by the Student Union as the official representative for the Part-Time and Older Than Average Full-Time Students, and works with the

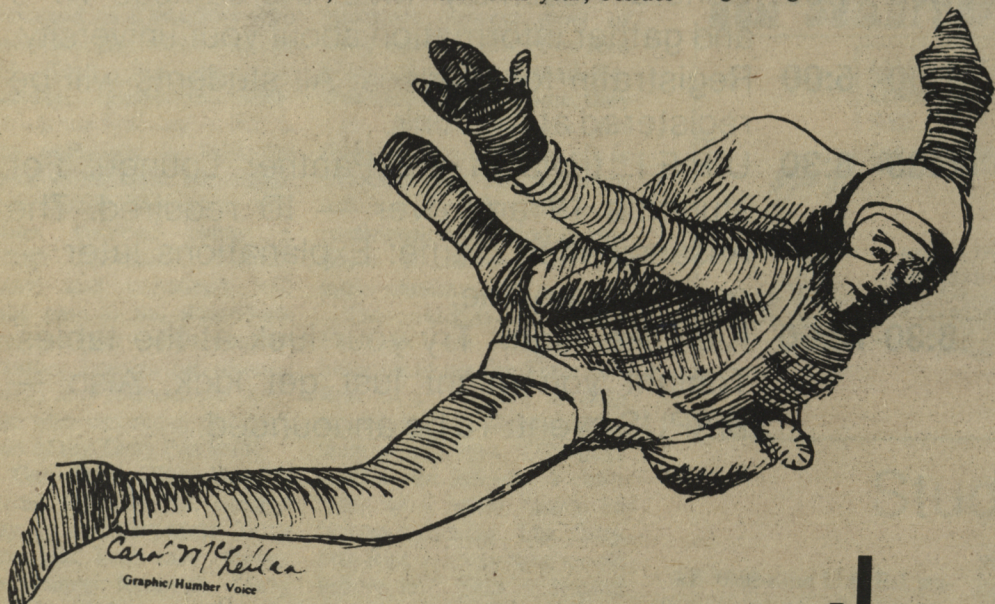

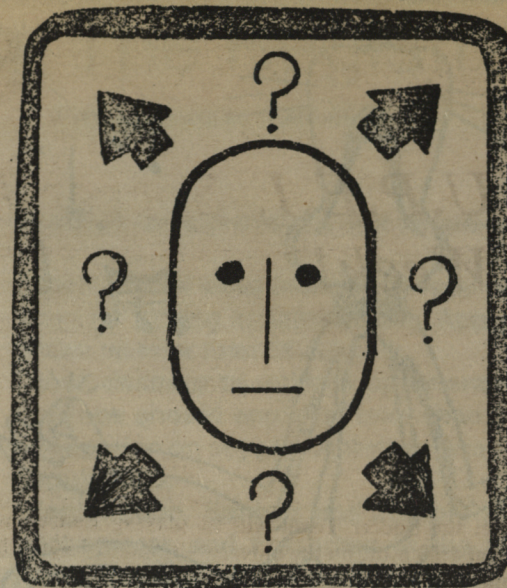
