FAREWELL MEETING.—The Rev. A. F. Carr, M. A., who has labored with much acceptance at Alberton for the past eighteen years, has, as THE EXAMINER has already intimated, accepted a call to Campbellton, N. B. On Monday evening last his parishioners at Alberton tendered him a farewell meeting. At this meeting addresses from the congregation and from the Young People's Society of the rev. gentleman were made by representative citizens and fellow-clergymen. To all the addresses Rev. WHO IS HE?—The Man says that a peculiar-looking individual recently visited the Halifax dispensary and asked for a bottle of medicine. He refused to tell what sort of medicine he wished for, who he was, or where he came from. He was promptly removed to the police station. There he said his name was Walter Davidson, and that he came from Charlottetown, where they called him "Jack the Ripper." He also asked that he be transported. Previous to his showing up at the dispensary, he had been an inmate of the Sailors' Home. Davidson has since been examined by City Medical Officer Trenaman and pronounced demented. He has been sent to the Poor's Asylum to await instructions from his friends.

THE RIFLE.—The Montreal rifle association, as a grand final of the shooting season, proposes to get up a gigantic telegraphic rifle match between the clubs of the leading cities of Canada, to be fired on Saturday, October 5th, with Martini-Henri rifles, ranges 200, 300 and 600 yards, seven shots at each range, for teams of twenty men. No sighting shots will be allowed. It is proposed to exchange the range totals by telegraph, also the weather details. The names of the teams are to be sent to Mr. Pringle, secretary of the Montreal association, not later than the 29th September. Another Big Strike.

ROTTERDAM, Sept. 27. The strike among the dock laborers is spreading to other occupations. The strikers, headed by Socialist leaders, paraded the streets this afternoon, and afterwards attempted to prevent the loading of a steamer, but were driven off by the police. Bodies of strikers gathered this afternoon, and became so menacing in their demonstrations that the police dispersed them with their sabres.

LONDON, Sept. 27.

Tillett, one of the leaders of the recent strike in London, will probably go to Rotterdam to-morrow to exercise his influence on behalf of the strikers. He has sent pickets to Torwich, the principal point for the departure of steamers for Rotterdam, who have already stopped many blacklegs on the way to Rotterdam to take the place of the strikers.

John Williams, a well-known Socialist, has been arrested in this city on a charge of intimidating men going to Rotterdam to take the place of the strikers.

Printers Discharged.

OTTAWA, Sept. 27.

Seventy eight printers were discharged from the Government printing bureau yesterday, after being six weeks at work, though they were promised steady employment. The men were engaged to work on the Dominion Voters Lists, but the Tory papers throughout the country have made such an outcry over the loss of pay that the lists have been farmed out to them and the printers discharged.
