Dewar Denies Charge

Opposition charges that he misled the Legislature in 1961 by giving false information was discounted yesterday by Dr. George Dewar, minister of education. Earlier in the day, Opposition Leader A.W. Matheson said he would seek the resignation of Dr. Dewar at the next session, claiming that Dr. Dewar had answered a question wrongly at the 1961 session. Mr. Matheson, referring to a public address made by Dr. Dewar Wednesday evening, pointed out that the minister said 312 students wrote Grade 12 examinations in the province in 1960. "A question asked by the opposition at the 1961 session brought the answer that 468 students had written the exams," said Mr. Matheson, "and if the 312 figure given by the minister is correct then the House was misled in 1961."

Dr. Dewar said he was referring Wednesday night to the number of regional high school pupils who wrote the examinations, not to the total number of students in the province. He said "my figures did not include Grade 12 students at Prince of Wales College and St. Dunstan's University who may have written the examinations."

Mobilize Outside Politics Speaker Says Of Industry

Speaking of the Atlantic Provinces, Hon. G.I. Smith, minister of finance and economics for Nova Scotia, told an Island audience last night "our people are our greatest resource". Mr. Smith was addressing Islanders at a banquet given by the Island Development Company at the Charlottetown Hotel.

Mr. Smith believes the greatest factor in the quality of its people is the quality of its people and their attitude. Speaking of the recent wave of prosperity and the number of new companies and plants locating in Nova Scotia, Mr. Smith credited this to a policy of economic planning and industrial Estates Limited. IEL is a crown corporation in Nova Scotia that has within the past eight years encouraged over 40 new companies to locate in Nova Scotia.

Mr. Smith said, "Industrial Estates Limited is not a government or political institution" though controlled by the government it contains, without regard to politics, some of the best business brains in Nova Scotia.

Speaking of the Island Development Company Mr. Smith said, "it is a delightful and somewhat new experience to

see people from other parts interested in us. It is a sign of the times that we are to be reckoned with and that we have a bright future."

Mr. Smith continued "A.G. Margison and his associates have shown great faith in Prince Edward Island and I am confident they will not regret that faith."

"Our task will be a little easier if national policy recognizes our problem," said Mr. Smith. **INCLUDE INCENTIVES**
Mr. Smith felt the national policy should include some incentives for industry to locate in areas of high unemployment. Mr. Smith paid tribute to Dr. Frank MacKinnon for his part in the development of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council and for his promotional work in selling the Atlantic Provinces to the rest of Canada. He said APEC was the first to identify the problems here and the first to persuade Maritimers to help themselves.

It has been indicated that legislation to set up a water authority to have control over pollution problems will be brought in. Also Dr. George Dewar, minister of education, said legislation to pave the way for creating larger units of administration in the province's elementary school system will be introduced.

NO MAJOR PROBLEMS

Premier Shaw indicated that there are no major problems facing the government at the session but did say that finances "are always a headache." He said "demand for increased services and rising costs of services are problems that are always with us."

The government intends to introduce a resolution dealing with New Brunswick Premier Robichaud's suggestion of union of the Atlantic Provinces. "Priority of opportunity will be given for all members to present their views on this subject," the premier said.

Survey Set For Parkdale On Rec. Centre

Possibility of the eventual building of a recreation centre in Parkdale to include skating and possibly gymnasium facilities is foreseen if results of a survey to be undertaken Monday are favorable.

The survey, on a door to door basis, will be conducted by the Parkdale Lions. It was stated last night by Chief Lion Steve MacDonald, who said the opinions of all householders would be sought to attempt to determine the extent of the need of recreational facilities for the youth of the village. When the results of the survey have been tabulated, Mr. MacDonald said, they will be made available to the Village Commissioners for their consideration. He expressed the belief the project might be carried through as a 1967 Canadian Centennial project with financial assistance from provincial and federal governments.

Hotel Fire Flares Again Momentarily

Shortly after one o'clock yesterday afternoon the city fire-fighting unit was called out again to the Queen Hotel fire scene.

Fire officials said that the rising winds had caused the smouldering rubble to flare up for a short period, but it was quickly extinguished. About mid-afternoon Fire Chief H.H. Jewell considered the fire to be completely out and ordered the fire watch, which had been maintained throughout Wednesday night and yesterday morning, to be discontinued. Fire Inspector Louis Ranshan, stated that from the investigation made so far it has been definitely established that the disastrous fire had started somewhere in the kitchen area but the exact cause has yet to be determined. "The investigation will resume this morning," he said.
