Boy Preacher's Vision' Stirrs Religious Revival

CAMPBELL'S CREEK, W. Va. (AP) - A boy preacher who claims to have seen a vision of Jesus Christ has stirred up a minor revival among residents of his southern West Virginia area. Two school teachers and 200 students have been converted by Spencer Campbell Jr., 16. A Methodist minister who has observed the boy says he is having an influence on the local religious community. The 16-year-old son of Dupont High School in the Campbell's Creek area was amazed with religious conviction as 148 students closed this spring because of the "little country" that God has seen fit to use. Campbell's influence in the high school has been striking as his prayers have been heard. Prayer meetings were held in a nearby Presbyterian church during lunch hours on several days. Some of the maistresses asked to be let out of the band because they didn't feel right about their uniforms, Campbell said.

Displaced Paper Costs Firm Job

OTTAWA (CP) - One misplaced piece of paper cost Davie Shipbuilding Limited a \$100,000 project. The largest conventional icebreaker in the world, an estimated \$100,000 project. The best method of play is to win the hand, and a matter of common sense and certainly does not depend on an all-encompassing formula. Take a case like this one, where you try to make three notrump. He starts with seven sure tricks and is looking for a way of increasing them to nine. The most obvious method of play is to win the diamond and take a spade finesse right away. If West has the king, this line of play is sure to succeed.
