DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

"Island Day" in the House.

Delay of the Stanley.

Davies on the Right Track.

OTTAWA, May 13.

Yesterday was Island Day in the House
of Commons. Mr. Perry brought up the
subject of winter communication. He
wanted returns of the steamer Stanley's
work last winter.

Mr. Davies followed, complaining of the
delay in getting the Stanley ready last fall,
of the want of a resident responsible officer
on the Island to direct the Stanley's move-
ments.

Hon C. H. Tupper replied that all pa-
pers will be brought down, and explained
that the cause of the delay last fall was
owing to the boilers having been filled with
salt water instead of fresh, and that it took
three days to get ready, not nine, as
charged by Mr. Davies.

Mr. Haggart gave figures showing that
the Island contributed proportionally the
smallest postal revenue of any part of the
Dominion, and said that the Government
send more than double the receipts in ac-
commodating the Islanders.

Perry inquired, why not apply the same
argument to the Intercolonial Railway and
the Ontario canals.

Mr. Laurier is still sick.

At the caucus of prohibition members
yesterday, it was announced that a res-
olution would be introduced demanding
immediate prohibition. This caused great
dissension and a number of members left
the caucus. It is believed that the resolu-
tion will have less support than in the last
Parliament.

Attempted Assassination.

LONDON, May 13.

It is reported that an attempt was made
to assassinate the Czaritch of Russia while
travelling in Shanghai. He received a
sword cut in his head—not serious enough
to cause him to change his programme.
