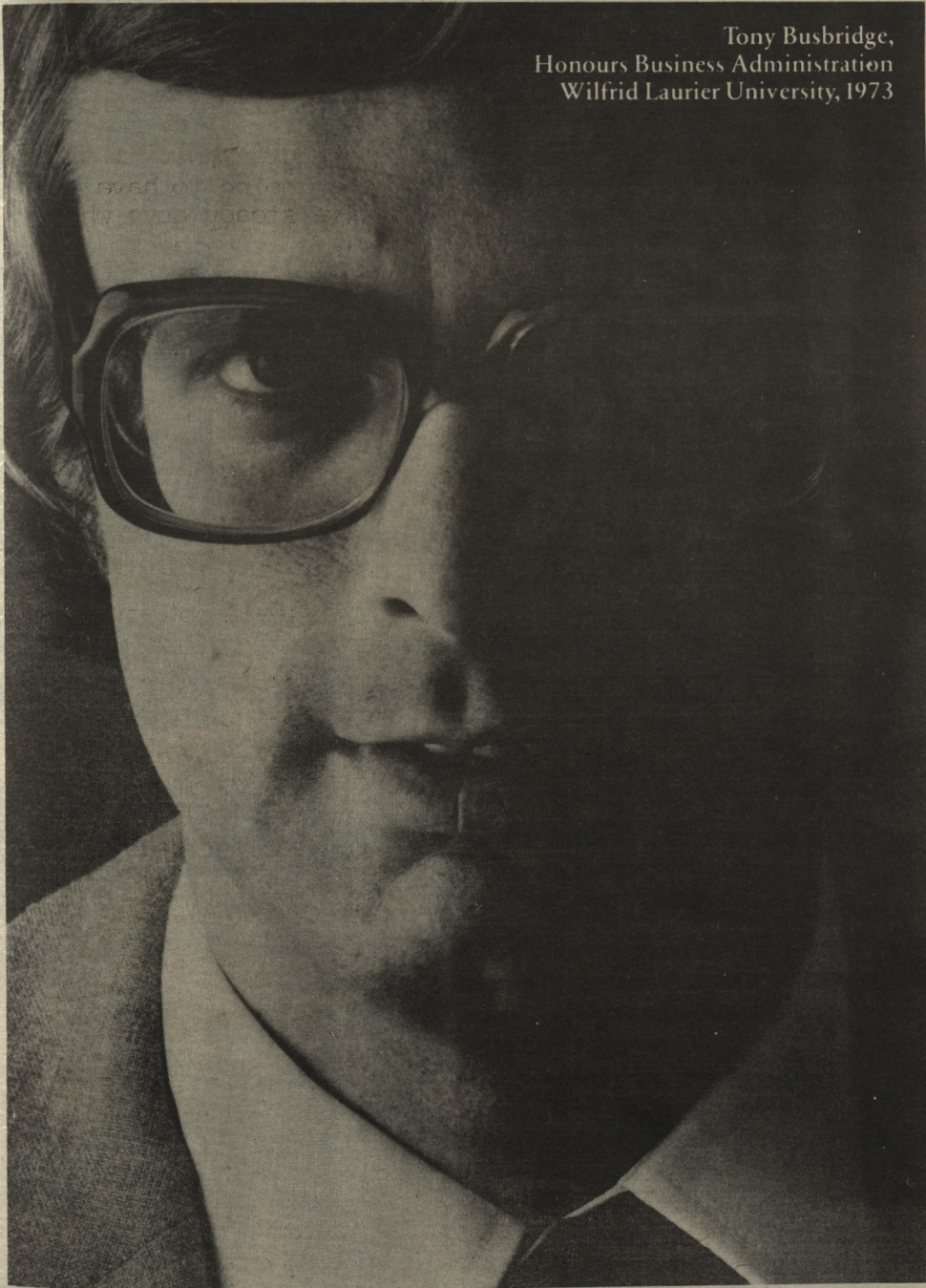
As I said before, we are working for the students so let's have a little feedback whether it be complimentary or critical. We welcome suggestions.
