St. John, Aug 10.—The annual meeting of the Grand Encampment of Oddfellows of the maritime provinces opened last evening. The representation was a large one. The officers elected for the ensuing year are as follows:

The grand patriarch, D A Grant, submitted his report. Membership had slightly increased during the year. There had been suspensions for non-payment of dues, but new members had offset these. One new encampment had been instituted during the year, this was in Country Harbor, in Guysboro county, N S, and was named Mt Pisgah Encampment, No 16. He had met with 10 of the 16 encampments in this jurisdiction during the year.

The grand scribe, Melville McKean, reported the net increase in membership as 21. The encampments now number 16, with a total membership of 536. The receipts were \$247.78 for the year, and expenditures \$199.80, leaving a balance on the year's transactions of \$37.98. The balance in the grand treasurer's hands on July 31st last, was \$366.51.
The grand scribe was directed to send fraternal greetings to grand encampment now in session at Gault, Ont.
Deputy Grand Sire Pinkerton, of Boston, delivered a stirring address on Oddfellowship. Mr. A. H. Blackely, superintendent of agencies of Oddfellows Assurance Association of Canada, Kingston, Ont., also delivered an able address on the order.

ELECTRIC LIGHT SPORTS.

Everything is ready for the great Electric Light Sports which take place to-night. The list of entries is a long one, and includes a number from the Mainland. The P. E. Island Electric Light Co. have charge of the lighting of the grounds. On Monday night the first test of the lighting was made with one of the Co's square dynamos. This was not a success. But last night at eleven o'clock a second test was made. This was a complete success in every way. The walk was perfectly illuminated from nail to nail. More lights were put in yesterday so that this evening there will be thirty-two (32) arc lights on the C. A. A. grounds, besides a large number of incandescent lamps in the dressing rooms &c.
The effect of last night's illumination, we are informed by a gentleman who was present, was strikingly beautiful. To see the grounds alone this evening will be well worth the admission fee.

Arrangements are being made to have a right away for cyclists and foot passengers along upper Prince's street past the residence of Hon. Judge Reddin. Before many days we hope to see a good street opened here. As there are racks for but seventy-five wheels, cyclists would do well to ride out and keep their wheels on the grounds where an attendant will keep watch over them. A limited number of horses and carriages will be admitted to the grounds; but the horses must be tied so as not to interfere with the spectators.

An English Diplomatist.

Sir Claude Macdonald, the British minister to China, is 40 years old and holds rank in the army as a major. He served with the Seventy-fourth highlanders and was in the Egyptian campaign of 1882 and the Suakim expedition before he was appointed consul general at Zanzibar in 1887. After leaving east Africa he was sent to the Niger, where he proved a very successful consul general in the Niger Coast Protectorate, as the district, which was once known as the "Oil Rivers Protectorate," is now designated. Sir Claude's career in west Africa was cut short in 1896 by his selection for the embassy at Peking.
