THE TRANSVAAL

Rumors Fill the Air—Transports to Take out British Forces.

LONDON, Oct. 9.—The Prince of Wales, on Saturday evening received General Sir Redvers Buller, who is about to leave for the Cape.

It is again announced that a cabinet council will be called shortly.

Six steamers of the Cunard company have been taken as transports for soldiers and munitions of war.

The famous "fighting fifth," Northumberland Fusiliers, have arrived at Cape Town. They were received with great enthusiasm.

Among the rumors coming from South Africa is one that the Boers' plans are about to show startling developments.

Another report is that the Outlanders fear that Rhodes and Schreiner are attempting to patch up some sort of a compromise.

THE PHILIPPINES

A Little Engagement in Which Fourteen Americans are Wounded.

MANILA, Oct. 9.—In an engagement, on Saturday, the Americans had five officers and nine privates wounded,—one officer mortally.

Against the Rule.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—The state department has been informed by the secretary of state for the Transvaal that it has appointed to be its diplomatic representative in Washington Gen. James O'Shaughnessy, a resident of Baltimore, and asking if he would be recognized by the American government.

Acting Secretary Hill, in replying by cable to the state secretary, notified him that the rules of the United States government forbid the recognition of an American citizen as the diplomatic representative of a foreign government.

Against the Laurier Policy.

TORONTO, Oct. 7.—The executive of the British Empire League in Canada, has passed the following resolution:—

"This league being of the opinion that the time has arrived in the development of the Empire when all parts of it should take some active share in the defence of its interests, would strongly urge that it is the duty of the Dominion of Canada to promptly offer a military contingent to the Imperial government for service in case of war in South Africa, and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the premier and minister of militia."

A Loyal Offer.

MONTREAL, Oct. 7.—Lieut-Colonel Cook, commanding the First Prince of Wales' Fusiliers, of this city has offered his regiment to the government for service in the Transvaal.

To Kill and to Cure.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—A host of officers, including Prince Christian Victor of Schleswig-Holstein, and a large number of nurses, sailed for the Cape yesterday.

Wheat Up!

LONDON, Oct. 7.—One result of the war scare is the advance of one shilling to 18 pence in the price asked for the wheat offered in the London market yesterday.

A SERIOUS CASE

Customs Officers Arrested for Arson

GUYSBORO, Oct. 7.—This county has attained an unenviable notoriety during the past few weeks in respect to crime in certain sections. Excitement in this town, which has been growing, reached fever heat this noon, when it became known that Enos L. Munro, collector of customs for Whitehead, had been arrested on serious charges of conspiracy and arson. The arrest of Munro is particularly interesting in view of the fact that it was he who obtained a verdict against Detective Power for alleged false arrest, for over \$600 damages, which the city paid. Munro had been arrested on a charge of stealing \$1,400 from the cashier of the Portland Packing Company. The cashier boarded at Munro's residence, and the money, it was alleged, was stolen from the room. Munro was apprehended by Detective Power but was subsequently acquitted, and a suit for damages was instituted. To-day Powers prosecutor is again in the hands of the law, and warrants have been issued for the arrest of others.

The information on which the collector was apprehended, was laid before Stipendiary Davison by Munro's own sister, Mrs. Hugh Munro, who deposed that Enos L. Munro, Cranwick Munro and Howard Munro, of Whitehead, Guysboro, between October 1st and November 1st, 1897, at Whitehead did wilfully conspire to set fire to government buildings at Whitehead—out house and boat house. The information further charged that the accused set fire to said buildings. Munro was arrested at daylight yesterday morning. His surprise was great. He decided to leave for home this morning, having come here to testify to the clearance of the vessel Juventa in the scuttling case. Mrs. Hugh Munro, the informant, is not only a sister of the collector, but is also the mother of Perry Munro and Arthur Munro, who were sentenced yesterday to the penitentiary in the perjury and scuttling case.

Cheeky Proposal.

OTTAWA, Oct. 7.—M. Menier having been refused exclusive fishing rights in the waters around Anticosti, now asks for exclusive rights to lobster fishing. Mr. Belliveau, the inspector for the St. Lawrence fisheries, has reported the matter to the government. Many Canadians take lobsters in Anticosti waters, and strong protests are being made against granting Mr. Menier's request.

Steamers for the Cape

MONTREAL, Oct. 7.—The Elder-Dempster steamers which have been requisitioned by the imperial government are, Montezuma, and Prah. Both of these boats run on the New Orleans route, so that the war business will not affect the company's St. Lawrence trade. One of the vessels will sail for the Transvaal from the Clyde, and the other from Malta.

Big Succession Duties.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 7.—The estate of the late W. W. Turnbull has paid 22,000 dollars in succession duties. The government claims nearly \$6,000 more which is referred to the supreme court.

Maxim Becomes a British Subject

LONDON, October 7.—The Gazette announces that Hiram Maxim and John Cornell Meigs, of the United States, have taken out certificates of naturalization. Mr. Maxim's certificate is dated September 16, and Mr. Meigs's August 30.
