

SIR CHARLES TUPPER VISITS THE EXHIBITION And Delivers an Eloquent Address.

SIR CHARLES TUPPER arrived by steamer from Picton last evening accompanied by Judge Caron, Madame Caron, Miss Taschereau and Miss Picard. The party took tea at Government House, and afterwards attended the concert of the Court Musicians.

To the Hon. Sir Charles Tupper, K. C. M. G. and C. B., High Commissioner of Canada in London.

The Commissioners appointed to conduct the Provincial Exhibition of Prince Edward Island for the present year, hail your visit to this Province, on the occasion of our annual Agricultural Show, with great satisfaction.

Blessed with a soil of unrivalled fertility and a climate singularly adapted to the growth of all the staple productions of the temperate zone, Prince Edward Island only requires fair access to foreign markets, and efficient communication with the mainland during the whole year, to enable her to take, relatively to her extent and population, a high place amongst agricultural communities.

The wonderful success which has attended the efforts put forth by yourself in connection with the representatives of the other Colonial possessions of Great Britain, in organizing and carrying forward the great Colonial and Indian Exhibition of the present year in London, is a cause for sincere congratulation.

In reply, Sir Charles delivered an eloquent address of about an hour's length—a full report of which will appear in THE EXAMINER. He returned thanks for the address, and said he regretted that he was unable to visit P. E. Island last year when making arrangements for the Indian and Colonial Exhibition; but he desired to thank most heartily the Government and people of the Island for their excellent contribution, without which the representation of Canada would have been incomplete.

Outside the Exhibition, building the centre of attraction was the ring within which the horses were judged. A most difficult duty the judges had to perform! Most of the classes were well filled; and the merits of many of the animals were so nearly equal, that their points had to be very carefully criticized. Altogether there were over a hundred and forty entries of horses. In every class the animals were excellent,—in some they were splendid.

It was particularly pleasing to see large classes of cart mares with their foals and cart fillies. The "horse buyers" have in recent years taken away so many prime animals that there seemed to be reason for fearing that few were left for breeding purposes and that profits from this source must necessarily be reduced. But the show of mares indicates that there is still abundance of material in the country for the production of good salable stock.

The classes of carriage horses were headed by "Hernando," "Rysdyk, jr.," "Black Pilot" and included many horses of breeding and merit. In carriage mares and fillies the competitors were very good,—the best animals being of course indicated by the prize list, though many others are worthy of honorable mention.

A GREAT CHANGE has taken place throughout Canada in the past twenty years. The country has made wonderful progress. An Intercolonial Railway, which Howe and Johnston toiled in vain, has opened up this section of the country, and the Canadian Pacific Railway has been extended from Quebec to the status of the Pacific.

does not present so splendid a work, accomplished in so short a time, by so small a population; and the most remarkable thing is that the burden of taxation is now just about the same as it was in 1879. Practically the Canadian Pacific Railway has been built without costing the country anything. The credit of the country is now higher than ever. There were on exhibition upwards of fifty pigs, some of them perfect monsters, all of them good in the several classes. Mr. McQuaid's monster sow and her litter were objects of special attention and the pure bred Berkshire pigs exhibited by Councillor T. A. McLean and E. R. Brow were justly admired by connoisseurs in the field.

Mr. Heartz sold yesterday two Holstein calves—bull and heifer for \$300. The bull five months old, weighs 800 pounds. Mr. Beal of Craup, exhibited a very fine foal of Brown Stud stock—one of the best shown. Mr. Lightner exhibited a beautiful Jersey Ayrshire cow, two years of age, which took third prize for cow of any age.

Mr. Caldwell Taylor, of Freetown, exhibits one of the most tasteful and artistic of the hooked mats on exhibition. A gentleman lately returned from the Upper Provinces states that the fruit and vegetables on exhibition in Charlottetown are, on the whole, infinitely superior to the fruit and vegetables exhibited in Montreal.

PROVINCIAL EXHIBITION. SUBWAY INVESTIGATIONS. The Show of Live Stock.

ABOUT four thousand persons were admitted to the Exhibition yesterday. Among the public and prominent men not already mentioned were Hon. Mr. Bell, Leader of the Opposition of Nova Scotia, Hon. Great interest was excited among the thousands who thronged the Drill Shed, by Senator Howlan's exhibit of the plans and models on which his "Subway Scheme" is built; and many were constrained to admit after prolonged examination that "there's a good deal in it." The plans showing the section of the Strait to be crossed are very carefully drawn, the gradients being obtained from Captain Maxwell's recent survey; and the depths at which the numerous specimens of sand and brick clay were obtained by the borings made under the direction of Mr. J. J. C. E., are precisely shown. The model of the caisson and tube were subjected by many persons to a most careful examination; and the maps, showing the relative lengths of the various lines of travel between Belleisle and Quebec, attracted the attention of a very much interested people.

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showed prime stock. Mr. Ferguson's Galloways, fresh from the pasture, are rolling in fat, and quite up to the mark of Easter beef cattle. Some very fine Ayrshires were shown—and some not so very fine. On the whole, the show of cattle was not what it might have been. Decidedly the best herd on the grounds was from the Government Stock Farm; and the various animals comprising it were greatly admired.

The exhibit of sheep was very good,—the competition in nearly all the classes keen. In sheep and cattle, Mr. Albert Boswell, of Lot 49 made 40 entries, and Henry Longworth, Esq., of Glenwood, 35. Mr. Cephas Nunn, of Winsloe Road, W. Rattray, E. R. Brow and others are also exhibitors of excellent stock. Of sheep, there were in all, 114 entries.

DURING a drunken row near Lower Spring Park Road, between twelve and one o'clock this morning, one of the participants, named Michael Power, was shot.
