A WRONG TO CITIZENS.

MR. TRAINOR drew attention, in the course of his speech at the Lyceum, to an anomaly in our political system. He referred to the fact that he could not vote for Mr. Paton because he was not the possessor of real estate in Charlottetown. There are hundreds, including many of our most intelligent citizens, who are in the same position as Mr. Trainor. Some of these conduct extensive business operations in the city, employ labor and hold leading positions in the body corporate and social. But they have only a half-interest in the body politic. They can't poll a vote which anyone who happens to possess a little land can poll. This discrimination against unlanded intelligence is not in any way due to the Opposition; and we hope that many of those who, like Mr. Trainor, find themselves the victims of it will on that account, if for no other reason, vote for Dr. S. R. Jenkins. If the doctor should obtain a strong support from them his hands will be strengthened to attempt a reform in this regard. In the country it's all very well to draw the line at land. But the case is different in the city.

WRONG SUPPORTED BY FALSEHOOD.

THE Patriot has been striving to convince the public that it's all right, and to allay the qualms of Mr. McKinnon's conscience by declaring that Mr. McKinnon has the majority independently of the deputy returning officers' blunders. The Patriot's statement is not true, and it is not reasonable. In East Queen's, as elsewhere, the Government, their candidates and workers, had the appointment of the deputy returning officers in their own hands. After they had exhausted all their "human devices," and all the influences of both Governments, in a supreme effort to defeat Mr. Martin, their deputy returning officers were compelled to count Mr. Martin. Is it likely, then, that fewer votes were actually polled for Mr. Martin than for Mr. McKinnon? Not at all. In point of fact, Mr. Martin, as already stated by THE EXAMINER, obtained the majority of votes. The seat is his by every principle of justice. But his opponent has been given it because one of the deputy returning officers committed a blunder or worse, and because the Judge gave him the advantage of the blunder or worse.

THE QUEBEC ELECTIONS.

THE elections which took place yesterday in Quebec resulted as everyone expected they would result. There only three weeks were given the Opposition to prepare for an unexpected call to the polls. The opposition was discouraged after the recent Dominion election and completely surprised. Only eight Opposition candidates are reported elected. It is to be noted that the Marchand Administration was not a bad one. The late Premier of Quebec would not tolerate or wink at Pineauism; and he was able to boast on his deathbed that he had fulfilled his pledges to the people, always regarding such pledges as sacred. The present Premier of Quebec has not been long enough in office to make a record of any kind. Almost his first public act was to demand an appeal to the people at three weeks notice—and this was the only outrage that the Opposition could charge him with. His was a different case, altogether, to that of Premier Farquharson who comes before the people as the leader of a government which owes its existence to Pineauism, which has left a whole district practically unrepresented in the Legislature, which has devoted public money borrowed from the banks to party purposes, which fulfilled the pledge to "make ends meet" by adding about five hundred dollars to the Provincial debt, and at the same time imposing taxes. The result in Quebec affords no criterion of the result in Prince Edward Island.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

LET'S have a clean election—no bribery or corruption of any kind on either side.

It is expected that Lord Roberts will reach England on the second or third day of the twentieth century.

—It is reported that only five million bushels of wheat have been inspected in Manitoba against thirteen millions last year.

Do you approve of the Government using your hard earned taxes to buy themselves into power? If not, vote them out.

Do you want the government contracts to be handled the same as the city electric light deal? If not, vote for Paton and Jenkins.

Don't let whiskey, bribery and corruption triumph on election day. But work and vote for Paton and Jenkins, who have declared for a clean and honest campaign.

WE appeal to the conscience of town and country—ought Pineauism to be approved? If not, the Farquharson Government candidates must be voted down.

Does the conscience of the country approve politicians who solemnly pledge themselves and then deliberately break their pledges? If not vote the Farquharson candidates out.

ARE we so short of men that one person must have a seat in both the City Council and Local House? On election day let it be known that one seat is enough for one man. Vote the square ticket—Paton and Jenkins.

It is reported that when addressing a meeting at Montreal in the

interest of Dr. Lacombe, liberal candidate for the legislature, Hon. J. Israel Tarte called upon the French-Canadians of the Dominion to organize and crush the Anglo-Saxons, who were insulting the French-Canadians. He mentioned Sir Charles Tupper and Hugh Graham, of the Montreal Star, as the chief agents in that particular. The union of all French-Canadians," said Tarte, "against the fanaticism of the Anglo-Saxons was necessary and must be continued, as it was the only way for them to secure their rights in the troublous times that are coming.

REV. HENRY LEWIS, a Methodist minister, formerly well known in this province, but now stationed in Stockton, Man., writes to the Winnipeg Telegram: "The temperance people have great reason to thank the Conservatives of Manitoba for at least doing something to compel the liquor dealers to defend themselves. Thomas Greenway, for years, footed the prohibitionists, and the day of retribution came. Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. Clifford Sifton are doing the same thing at Ottawa, but retribution is coming, and the instruments that will bring it are—the Winnipeg Free Press and Mr. Tarte."

IN THE STATES.

An Old Friend Interested in Our Politics.

DEAR SIR,—It is a great pleasure to receive your WEEKLY EXAMINER every Monday morning.

Of course, I, in common with every loyal son of P. E. Island, take a very lively interest in all that transpires in our native Isle. I was somewhat surprised at the result of the Dominion election held on the 7th ult. I reasonably supposed the Liberal-Conservatives would have been returned to power. But I think I have a reasonable solution of the matter. Prior to the general election in 1893 Mr. Laurier delivered many addresses in United States, and led the people here to believe his party was going to give to the people of this country free trade. At that time his party press circulated reports which led the people here to infer that Canada was anxious to become a part of this Republic, and was only restrained by the tyranny of the British Government. But since the G. I. has come into power, there has been no move made in that direction, and they did not even gracefully surrender the territory in Canada adjoining Alaska. Mr. Laurier need come here no more. He has shown himself at least loyal to Canada. Many of the promises of that party, made previous to that election, have been broken,—and it is better that they were.

I presume the electors feel proud of them because they abandoned their foolish policy and broken their promises to pursue a sound, honest, business policy,—that laid down and followed by Sir John A. Macdonald, Sir Charles Tupper and their co-workers, and violated that as little as they did.

I feel pleased to think that P. E. Island voted as she did. In the coming local election I hope to see the Liberal-Conservatives returned with a good majority.

I should like very much to hear the addresses of my old friends on the election questions. Of course I have listened to good speakers here, notably Senator Hoar, J. B. Reed and Henry Cabot Lodge. Senator Hoar has the platform appearance, manner and eloquence of my esteemed friend, Robert D. MacLaren. But for a good off-hand speech my old friend J. P. Tanton is not easily surpassed.

Against Canadian Preference.

OTTAWA, Dec. 7.—Thomas McFarlane, delegate of the Ottawa Board of Trade to the fourth congress of the Chambers of Commerce in London, presented an able report. He recommended the abolition of the preference in favor of British goods and the substitution of an additional 5 per cent. to the existing tariff on all classes of foreign goods, whether free or dutiable, for imperial purposes. This he thought would force the hand of the British Government. The report was referred to a special committee.

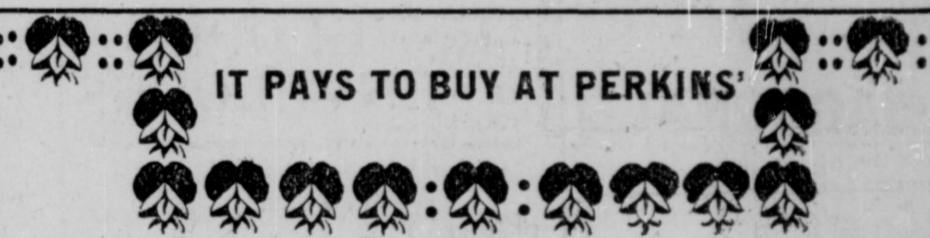
