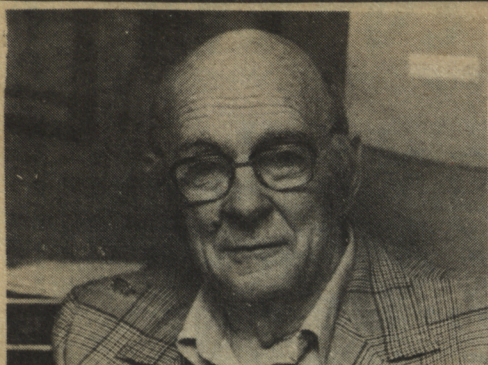


WORST WEEKEND EVER
