

# Legionaires Win Over All-Stars

## San Diego Wins AFL Ch'ship

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — San Diego's thunderbolt fullback, stunned Boston Patriots Sunday with two spectacular first-quarter runs and then blitzed to a record individual performance in leading San Diego Chargers to a 31-10 rout of the Patriots and the American Football League championship. It was the highest scoring 100-yard game in the AFL's four-year history.

Lincoln, who runs like a halfback and catches passes like an end, set up San Diego's first touchdown with a 56-yard run, streaked 67 yards for his own first touchdown and scored a second touchdown on a 35-yard pass from Tobin Rohe, formerly of Toronto Argonauts of the Canadian Football League.

San Diego's first league title in three tries actually was secured with a 21-point first quarter against the best defence in the four-season-old AFL.

# New York Rangers Defeat Toronto Maple Leafs 3-2

NEW YORK (AP)—A second period goal by rookie Dave Richardson—his first in the National Hockey League — gave Toronto a 2-2 tie with the Toronto Maple Leafs.

## Black Hawks Edge Boston

CHICAGO (CP-AP)—Chicago Black Hawks defeated the last place Boston Bruins 5-3 Sunday night and took a three-point lead in the National Hockey League.

Plante made 30 stops in the first Ranger victory over the Maple Leafs this season after four losses and two ties. Maple Leaf goalie Johnny Bower made 28 saves, including 20 in the first period.

The Bulldogs made a tour of Russia, Czechoslovakia, Germany and Switzerland in November and December.

The suspension of Fox will be automatically recognized by all hockey associations of the world.

The goal of the judges will be to make the award to "that man or woman who, during 1963, has best used the means available to serve a useful Island purpose". Letters of nomination are invited to assist them in making their choice on that basis.

It is hoped, through the letters, to make sure that the names of all who should be considered, and the deeds to their credit, will reach the attention of the judges. The intent of the award is to honor the quality of deeds, and not necessarily their size.

With the help of readers, through letters of nomination which keep this thought in mind, the award could go to some woman who has made a quiet sacrifice to help a neighbor's child to health—to a pastor, teacher or doctor who has been unusually effective in adding to the meaning of life for some person or group—just as easily as to some better-known person.

It follows that letters from readers can add greatly to the significance of the tribute to be paid.

## NOMINATIONS CLOSE JAN 8

In making the annual "Islander of the Year" Award, established in 1959, The Evening Patriot plays no part in the judging. Instead, it acts as a clearing house for letters of nomination, which go to the judges, and shares with all Islanders in honoring the person selected.
