EXPECT VICTORY.

The Hon. Hugh John Macdonald on The Prohibition Question.
(Montreal Witness, Independent Liberal.)

There was a look of resolution in the eye of Mr. Macdonald, the president of the Sir John Macdonald Club. Mr. Henry Dalby, the Conservative organizer, was unwontedly buoyant and merry. The Hon. George Foster does not easily throw off that saturnine air which has become habitual to him, but even the ex-Finance Minister, after being closeted with the Hon. Hugh John Macdonald, skipped about like a young man. Mr. Quinn is a little ponderous, but Mr. Quinn was elastic, and young, and joyous. Indeed, the faithful were in a state of much elation today.

The leaders were in their midst, confident of victory. Sir Charles, looking well and strong, brought back from the east the most glowing reports. The Hon. Hugh John Macdonald, perfectly certain that not a seat west of Lake Superior could be secured by the Liberals.

The Windsor Hotel was the Mecca of Conservative desire today. The hiring was there, and he who wanted to make a little "to the side"; the conscientious Conservative, who desired the triumph of his principles, paid his respects to Sir Charles; the stream of visitors was constant.

"Hugh John will be a tower of strength," said Mr. Dalby today, "in the coming fight. He has not merely a great name, but he has the lineaments of his great father. These will have their effect all over the country, and especially in this province, where Sir John is remembered with so much love and respect."

As to the prospects, Mr. Dalby spoke in the most confident manner of the result. When he first took hold of the work of organizing it was pretty generally felt that little could be expected at this election, and that the only thing to do would be to take a beating like a gentleman. All this was changed, and the tone was one of settled conviction that the country would be carried by the Conservatives with a splendid majority. This was his own conviction after a careful study of the whole field, including Quebec, which would give a surprise to the Liberal party.

HUGH JOHN'S OPINION.

In conversation with a "Witness" representative, Mr. Macdonald rapidly glanced at the situation.

"You thought the whole thing out, Mr. Macdonald, before you took the step of relinquishing the premiership of Manitoba?"

"Yes; I certainly went over the ground pretty well."

"Did you size up the situation to your satisfaction?"

"Of course I cannot speak for the east, but I know the west pretty well, and I am confident that the Liberals cannot carry a single seat west of Lake Superior."

"That is to say, you expect Manitoba, the North-West Territories and British Columbia to go Conservative?"

"Yes. There may be a little doubt as to Winnipeg, owing to the fight being (as it would appear) a triangular one, which may result in the election of a labor candidate for the city, but outside of this instance, I have no doubt at all in my mind as to the Conservatives carrying every seat west of Lake Superior."

As to the prohibition question in Manitoba, Mr. Macdonald said the matter was

now before the courts. Should it be determined that the province had the power which it proposed to exert, then by next June there would be prohibition in Manitoba.

"Prohibition was a plank in the Conservative platform?"

"Yes, but not put in by me. I pointed out at the time what it might mean to insert it, but it was said that it need not necessarily mean anything extreme. I replied that I always believed it in meaning what I said, and if a thing were promised it should be implemented in politics as well as in any other relation of life."

"Then, in carrying out the platform, it was simply a pledge of honor, and not personal conviction?"

"As far as I am concerned, yes. You may remember that upon a former occasion I told you I was not a prohibitionist myself. We had two plebiscites in the province, which gave a result of six to one in favor of prohibition. We could not afford to ignore such an expression of opinion, unless we wanted to do as the federal government has done," said Mr. Macdonald, laughingly.

NEW BRUNSWICK PROSPECTS

(Montreal Star.)

Hon. Geo. E. Foster, the ex-Minister of Finance, who accompanied Sir Charles Tupper, upon his arrival in Montreal was asked as to the political outlook in New Brunswick. Mr. Foster replied:

"The prospects of a Conservative victory never looked better, and I cannot see any grounds except that of boodle upon which the Liberals expect to carry the province of New Brunswick. I cannot see where they have made the slightest gain, although I certainly see the plainest evidence that they have lost. As for the Conservative party, while I see no indication whatever of the slightest defection from our ranks, there are signs every day that we are gaining ground."

"We had last week what I have been told was the largest meeting ever held in Moncton, and Mr. Powell is gaining strength every day. The Acadians are rallying to the support of the Conservatives, and Mr. Monahan, M. P., created a splendid impression among them, and helped us a great deal throughout the province. His clear and calm speeches carried conviction, and the effect of them will not be easily destroyed. The member for Jacques Cartier is delighted with the trip and intends to return to the Maritime Provinces again. If he does so he will meet with the warmest welcome."

Mr. Foster referred in the most hopeful terms to the prospects in Prince Edward Island. Mr. Stewart, who opposes Sir Louis Davies, is at the head of the Bar of the Province, and is a splendid speaker and is very popular among all classes. The other candidates are the very best men that could be desired, and a sweeping victory for the Conservative party will take place in the Island at the first call to the polls.

Mr. Foster is still under the impression that the election will be held at an early date. When asked when he was going back to Ottawa a few days ago Sir Louis Davies said: "Not until after the elections." The Liberals, however, have done very little in the way of nominating candidates in New Brunswick. "Election or no election," said Mr. Foster, "we are making hay, and I think everybody will admit that we are in good condition."

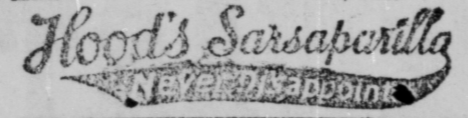
