SIR RICHARD SEES A GHOST

(Montreal Star.) No wonder that Sir Richard Cartwright walked out of the House of Commons while Mr. Davin was reading the Huntingdon Gleaner's editorial on the railway subsidies. The Gleaner is one of the best edited and most respected newspapers advocating Liberal principles, and it is no small compliment to the editorial to say that it read very much like one of Sir Richard's old speeches. It must have come to him with a shock as though the ghost of his former self had come to rebuke the doughty old statesman for his silence when a word from him would have saved millions of dollars to the people of Canada.

We dislike to say anything harsh of Sir Richard Cartwright. His past services to Canada, his intellectual attainments, his honorable record, entitle him to the respect of all Canadians irrespective of party. But these are the very things that make his present apathy so strange. This whole wonderful session, with its gigantic and unprecedented schemes for robbing the Canadian taxpayer and its unequalled revelations of electoral fraud and corruption has produced nothing so wonderful as the silence of Sir Richard Cartwright!

He has been humiliated and degraded by his political friends as his political opponents could never have humiliated and degraded him; and he has kept silent.

He has seen every principle that he advocated trampled under foot, by his own associates; and he has held his peace.

He has seen every pledge that he made on behalf of his party, repudiated or contemptuously broken and dishonoured; and he has not opened his mouth.

The very scum of both political parties laugh the great champion of Liberal principles to scorn and whisper in his ear "Samson, the Philistines be upon thee!" And the strong man, to all all appearance, is shorn and bound and blind.

Treaty With Trinidad.

LONDON, Aug. 12.—Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, secretary of state for the colonies, informed the West Indian commission yesterday that subject to ratification, a convention has been arranged with the United States on behalf of Trinidad, admitting certain American products duty free into Trinidad, and reducing American duties on certain articles 12 1/2 per cent, while granting the United States favored nation treatment.

A tidal wave burst in San Francisco bay on Friday tearing down the embankment and sweeping off a number of locomotives and merchandise. The loss is estimated at a million dollars.

Ship Sunk.

TORQUAY, Eng., August 10.—The British battleship Sanspareil, while returning from the manoeuvres, sank a full rigged ship off the Lizard. One man was drowned. The warship communicated the news to the other ships of the fleet by wireless telegraphy. The vessel sunk was the British ship East Lothian, Captain McFarlane, 1,339 tons, which left Manila on February 9th, for Nantes, France, where she arrived July 21.

The Alliance Strengthened

LONDON, Aug. 11.—The Paris correspondent of the Daily News says: M. Delcasse's visit to St. Petersburg will result in addition of certain stipulations to the treaty of alliance, the object of which is to enable France and Russia to follow an identical policy on arbitration questions which may arise.

Dewey will Visit London

LONDON, Aug. 10.—A despatch to the Daily Mail from Rome says that Admiral Dewey will arrive in that city on Wednesday. He has asked an audience of the Pope. The correspondent adds that it is the intention of the admiral to visit London before returning to the United States.

It's Looking Warlike

LONDON, Aug. 11.—The St. James Gazette this afternoon says all the shipping companies under charter to the British Admiralty for transport purposes have been notified to hold their transports in reserve for the immediate dispatch of troops. The steamer Dunera has been ordered to be in readiness Saturday to ship a detachment of horse artillery to South Africa.

Against Religious Orders

ST. SEBASTIAN, SPAIN, Aug. 11.—The republican and socialist party have agreed to commence a campaign demanding the expulsion from Spain of all religious orders. Senors Saimoran and Iglesias, and other socialists are prominent in the movement.
