POPE LEO AT HOME

An American Woman's Audience With the Venerable Pontiff

The strong interest which attaches itself to Pope Leo and to the Vatican makes especially readable "A Private Audience With the Pope," in the February Ladies' Home Journal. It is from the pen of Inez Merrill, an American woman, and is cleverly descriptive. "As the Pope entered the room all present knelt," she says, and goes on to explain: "We had no definite idea of the etiquette on the occasion, so we proceeded as we thought best. He came to our party almost at once, and addressed me first. He speaks French to the general public to priests he speaks Latin. "Six priests kept close to the Pope as he moved about the room. One of them was an interpreter, who supplied the missing links in the conversation if necessary, in order, I suppose, to make the occasion less tedious to the Pope. However, the Holy Father spoke distinctly and slowly, and in spite of the excitement of the moment we were able to understand all that he said.

"Pope Leo XIII looks very old, very feeble, with that pallor peculiar to age; his eyes are black and shining, but withal kindly; his thin, white hair and noble brow would incline one to a feeling of reverence even if he were not a Pope. He is of medium height, and his shoulders are a little rounded, as might be in one who looks down from such an elevation as his. His smile—that very-much-talked-of smile—is benign. He wore a rich red cloth robe of the most beautiful texture. This was closely buttoned to his feet. Over this was a pure white garment made of some soft material, and it is in this that most of his photographs are taken. On his head he wore the small skull-cap called the *zucchetta*. It, too, is pure white. There is a tassel hanging down to one side. The thought that Popes for centuries have been wearing garments precisely similar to these lent an added interest to this quiet person, moving unobtrusively around among his guests. On his hands he wore mits of white wool."

THE THREE DAILY MEALS

Mrs. S. T. Rorer Prescribes Foods That are Easy to Digest

"The average person may take for breakfast a sub-acid fruit, such as raw, baked, steamed or stewed apple, ripe peach, a bunch of grapes or a very soft pear," writes Mrs. S. T. Rorer, on "What Indigestion Really Means," in the February Ladies' Home Journal. "This may be followed by a bowl of well-cooked cereal with a little milk, a slice of whole wheat bread, and, if he has been accustomed to it, a cup of clear coffee, one-half heated milk. No other food is actually necessary—in fact, one might be better off with even a lighter meal. The heavy breakfast, quickly and carelessly eaten by the average family, brings about such diseases as come to the over-eaters—rheumatism, gout, uric acid conditions and Bright's disease.

"The noonday meal should be light, unless two hours' rest can be taken. It may consist of a cream soup, two or three slices of whole wheat bread and butter, any little light minced meat, and again fruit. This meal may be closed with a rice pudding, a cup custard or some simple dessert made principally from eggs and milk, rice and milk, or whipped cream. The night meal, after the day's work is over, should for its first course have a perfectly clear soup, either plain consommé or bouillon made entirely from vegetable matter, or clear, light tomato soup; the idea is to warm and stimulate the stomach without giving nourishment. Follow this with a red meat, either beef or mutton, broiled, roasted, or boiled; one starchy vegetable, as rice, macaroni, potato, or in the winter, boiled chestnuts; one green vegetable, as carefully-cooked cabbage, cauliflower, spinach, asparagus, green peas or beans, stewed cucumbers or squash, according to the season of the year; then a light dinner salad composed of either celery, lettuce, cress, endive or chickory, or even shredded raw cabbage dressed with a little oil and a few drops of lemon juice, with a bit of cheese and a bread stick, or a wafer or a piece of brown bread, followed by some very light dessert similar to those mentioned for the noonday meal."

THE WORKING-GIRLS GREAT CHANCE

Domestic Service the Most Comfortable and Most Remunerative Occupation

"The average home holds out a far more comfortable time, a more leisurely life, a healthier existence, and better wages, than does the office, store or factory to an intelligent girl or woman," writes Edward W. Bok of "The Working-Girl's Great Chance," in the February Ladies' Home Journal. "The same time devoted, for example, to the study of shorthand or typewriting, if given to the study of nursing or domestic service, would mean twice the income to a bright, steady girl.

Unfortunately, girls will not see this, and thousands of them who are to-day struggling through an existence in the outer world, could have far more comfortable lives and better wages in excellent homes. How the average girl can deliberately shut her eyes to the opportunity which fairly glares upon her as a good maid, nurse, companion or domestic of any sort, passes average comprehensions. There has never been a time when mistresses were readier or more willing to pay good wages for good domestic service—wages compared to which the pittance paid in shops or factories sinks into insignificance. And, on the other hand, the salaries of women in business, as recent statistics plainly show, are gradually on the decrease because of the willingness of hundreds of girls to work for a mere pittance. Every business house has to-day waiting lists of scores of hundreds of applicants, while hundreds of homes cry out for intelligent domestic service."

THE INDIAN'S OPINION

The Western Indians, though not fond of work, do not approve of indolent white men. The "heap good white man" is the white man who works hard; and to sit by and watch him as he toils seems to afford them never-failing pleasure. Some young "warriors" of the Blackfoot tribes sat one day watching a group of laborers who were constructing a grade for a branch railroad in Montana. GAINSBOROUGH.

The Great Portrait Painter and Some of His Peculiarities.

Mrs. Gainsborough of Sudbury employed her spare time in producing water color sketches of flowers, and doubtless for the sake of keeping him out of mischief she allowed her little son, Thomas, to play with her brushes. As a result the world is richer by over 200 exquisite paintings.

Gainsborough's first picture of the beautiful Georgiana Spencer was painted when she was only 6 years old. He painted her again after her marriage with the Duke of Devonshire, but was so dissatisfied with the result that he would not send it to Chatsworth. "Her grace is too hard for me," he cried, drawing his pencil across her mouth on the canvas.

In 1783, however, a satisfactory portrait was completed. The picture passed into the Wynn Ellis collection and was put up for sale at Christie's in 1879.

Agnew bought it for £10,605—a higher price than had ever been given at Christie's. It was conveyed to Agnew's gallery in Bond street, and a few days afterward the frame was found to be empty, the picture having been carefully cut out.

A large reward was offered for the picture, and great excitement roused all over the country. The mysterious loss has never been explained, and the beautiful "Duchess" is still missing.

Gainsborough's exquisite picture of Mrs. Siddons is one of the greatest portraits ever painted. It hangs in the National gallery, the coloring as fresh as if it had been laid on yesterday.

As in the case of the duchess' portrait, Gainsborough had a difficulty in completing it to his satisfaction. The actress' long nose almost baffled his power of draftsmanship, and he impatiently threw down his brush, crying, "There's no end to it!" His impatience calmed down fortunately, and the portrait was finished.

Gainsborough's impatience was proverbial.

"You will be sure to paint the dimple in my chin," said a would be sitter. "I will paint neither," was the artist's reply.

On another occasion he blotted out a completed face from the canvas with one movement of his brush on hearing the pompous voice of the original inquiring if "that fellow Gainsborough had done his work at last."

He quarreled with the Royal academy committee because they refused to hang his large picture of the three princesses as near to the ground as he wished, and tried to provoke Sir Joshua Reynolds to anger. But the quarrel was forgotten on his death-bed.

The great rival painters met as Gainsborough's life ebbed away, and taking Sir Joshua's hand he whispered:

"We shall all be in heaven together, and Vandyke (his favorite painter) will be of the company."—English Exchange.

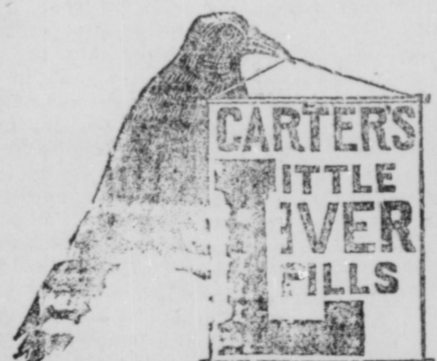
