

Coldwell Blames Gov't For Postponing Decisions

PRINCE RUPERT, B.C. (CP) — CCF Leader M. J. Coldwell said Tuesday night Canadians will pay higher freight rates and bigger telephone bills in Ontario and Quebec if the Progressive Conservatives are re-elected March 31.

He made the statement at a public meeting here in referring to the government's decision to suspend until May 1 recent freight rate and telephone increases approved by the board of transport commissioners. Before May 1 the cabinet will hear appeals against the increases,

amounting to 3.6 per cent for the railways and to three per cent for the Bell Telephone Company. Mr. Coldwell described the government's action as a "smart political trick."

UNPOPULAR DECISION
The postponement, he said, "can mean only that the government's decision when it comes will be politically unpopular. It can mean only that the government, if re-elected, will approve these increases with perhaps some face-saving modifications."

That was the only reason a decision had been postponed. The statements were included in excerpts from the text of a speech issued to the press before delivery.

Mr. Coldwell said the government's decision to delay action on the appeals was an example of government postponement and evasion.

"Never before have so many problems been postponed in so little time by so many cabinet ministers. The record of the Liberal government was one of procrastination and delay, but surely that of the Conservative government is one of postponement and stall."

In fact, Prime Minister Diefenbaker had postponed practically everything except 1958 election. Mr. Coldwell said other examples of government postponement and delay included shelving of a promise made in the last election campaign to reduce taxes by \$500,000,000 and failure

to launch a public works program to reduce unemployment this winter.
