Refresher Courses In Cancer For Island Doctors This Year



Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, O.B.E., who was re-elected President of the P. E. I. Division of the Canadian Cancer Society at its annual meeting of the organization last night.

The 1952 Cancer campaign will be held in September and Island doctors will be sent away again this year for refresher courses in cancer. This was revealed at the annual meeting of P. E. I. Division of the Canadian Cancer Society held in Charlottetown last night.

Dr. MacMillan said that general practitioners will be sent this year and will be selected by the executive of the Island Medical Society. Full expenses of the doctors will be paid by the Cancer Society.

Dr. MacMillan said further that more has been done here in cancer education than in most sections of Canada; more patients reported to the cancer clinics last year than in any previous year.

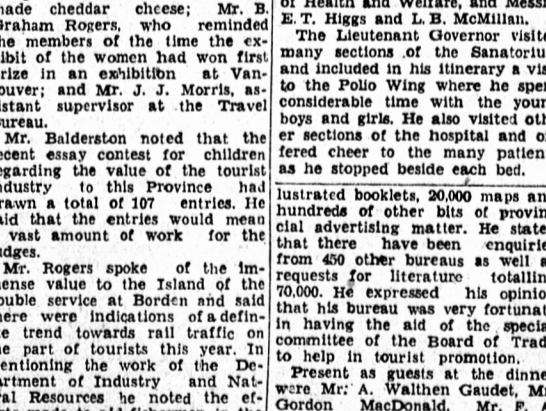

Inspector H. Hewitt, of the Donald Inspections Company Ltd., Montreal, who is employed by the city to have a proper oversight of the work, is quite satisfied with the way in which material is reaching the city plant, and is being processed, conveyed to location and finally used in re-surfacing or seal coating, as conditions require.

Responsibility for the various operations essential to speed and accuracy in having the streets put in good condition has been allocated to key men, who are reputed to be competent. Mr. Louis Ranahan, roller operator, is in charge of the paving crew, assisted by Hector MacQuinn.
