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IN MEMORIAM

MR. W. B. MacARTHUR

—On October 29 there passed away at Kensington one of the oldest and most respected citizens, Mr. W. B. MacArthur.

Mr. MacArthur was born in Margate in 1868, and would have been 86 years old on his next birthday. He spent practically all his life in Margate and Kensington, with the exception of two years in Boston and Lynn, Mass.

He was eminently successful as a farmer, fox rancher, and owner and driver of race horses. His natural business acumen and ability to gauge the future were attributes which spelled success in all his undertakings.

His many acts of kindness were done on the principle of "not letting the left hand know what the right hand doeth." It enabled him to be able to help a neighbor in distress.

The large number of silver cups and other trophies testify to his outstanding success in fox ranching. He had the unique experience of having witnessed the change in farming methods from the scythe and flail to the "combine" harvester and from the wooden cultivators, ploughs, rakes, etc., to the latest steel implements.

He leaves to mourn the memory of a kind, loving and provident husband and father, his widow, the former Eliza (Ramsay) Sinclair, two daughters, Ethel and Ruth (Mrs. W.J. Semple); also two sons, Myron and Roy of Kensington, and 14 grandchildren.

His first wife, Anzetta MacGillivray, a daughter of Mrs. Roy Taylor, and a son, Newton, predeceased him some years ago.

Many beautiful floral pieces, including a pillow from his nieces, Mrs. Edward Uch and Mrs. Gillespie of Calgary, were silent tributes to his memory.

The funeral was held at the Presbyterian Church, Kensington, on Nov. 1, and was largely attended. His interment was in the family plot in the People's Cemetery.

Rev. D. A. Campbell conducted the services and gave an eloquent eulogy. The hymns sung were "Forever With The Lord," "The Lord's My Shepherd," and "Safe In The Arms of Jesus." A duet, "Going Down the Valley" was sung by Messrs. Andrew Johnstone and Ernest Dunning.

Deacon-Higgins Wedding

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Party Planned For Soldiers From Korea

VANCOUVER, (CP)—A bang-up party is planned here today. Guests of honor will be more than 1,000 Canadian soldiers returning to their homes following service with the 25th Canadian Infantry Brigade in Korea.

The troops, the majority members of the 3rd battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, are scheduled to arrive at 6:30 a.m. PST aboard the United States troopship Marine Lynx.

The homecoming draft is made up of 764 officers and men of the PPCLI and 290 members of other units.

Arrival of the Marine Lynx will mark the first time returning Canadian Korean veterans have docked in Vancouver since 1945 and civic and military officials plan a reception complete with all the trimmings.
