

Oppositionist Meeting.

PLATFORM: "LET US INSIDE."

THE Oppositionists of this city held a mass meeting in Market Hall last evening. The season being dull, the city short of amusements, and political meetings a novelty, the audience was, as expected, large, and was composed of supporters of both parties.

HON. THOMAS W. DODD occupied the chair; and, when opportunity arrived, was closing a "stirring" speech on asylum mismanagement. We regret we did not hear the first part of Mr. Dodd's speech. However, we are assured he said nothing about "register grates," or "marble mantle-pieces."

WILLIAM WELSH, Esq., at the close of the chairman's remarks, mounted the rostrum. He carried with him that well-polished, black-thorn stick. On approaching the chairman's table he held it up; enquired if the Reporter of the EXAMINER was present, and said he exhibited the stick for his benefit. He then proposed Frederick Peters, Esq., as a candidate at the coming election. He said Mr. Peters had something to look forward to (the office of Attorney General, perhaps, and a Judgeship in the distance); and then proceeded to draw some invidious comparisons about the revenue the city was not receiving and the revenue it should receive from the Local Government. He repeated his cry about the Fishery Award, and then cut his piece short and left the stage, shaking his head with determination, and saying, as he descended:

"I will support no party which does not get our share of the Fishery Award."

"I will support no party which will not lift Charlottetown out of the mud."

JOHN H. GATES, Esq., seconded the motion.

CAPT. SAMUEL McRAE, proposed Thomas Morris, Esq. He "thought" they "might" put confidence in the gentleman. After a short harangue about "false promises" etc., bowed, and made an exit.

JOHN BOWERS, Esq., a member of the Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance for the past thirty years, seconded the nomination of Thomas Morris, Esq.

The motions were put and carried on a division of voices—the "Yeas" being a note higher than the "Nays."

The candidates then took the platform.

MR. MERRIS came forward and smiled a pleasing sort of smile, which captured the numerous boys, and they laughed heartily. He said "he expected he was again getting into trouble; but it was not of his own will. Four years ago he got into trouble of the same kind, but got out of it the day after the election." He will have the same good luck, no doubt, this time. He complained of the allusions made to him in the EXAMINER, and said he had the same right to seek election in Charlottetown as the Editor of the EXAMINER had to seek election in Fort Augustus. We grant this. The Editor, however, is not seeking honors just now. Mr. Morris next referred to himself as a benefactor of the City of Charlottetown. He purchased Spring Park one time, he said, and saved the water for the citizens. Land was cheap then, and Mr. Morris made a paying investment. Hence his beneficence in this instance. At another period of his existence, he said he voted against leasing Pownal Wharf, for a term of years. The wharf then was an expense and an eyesore to citizens, and the principal reasons Mr. Morris had in casting his vote against it was because of a personal dislike to the gentlemen who wished to lease the wharf—another instance of his beneficence. He also opposed water-works. Who, having large brewing interests would not! This is the crowning work of his life. Really he is a benefactor of the City of Charlottetown. Mr. Morris next referred to the policy and working of the present Government. His statements, in every instance, proved that he knew little about the Government, and less of its policy. After spending an immense quantity of rant, he thanked the meeting for nominating him, and then retired.

Before Mr. Morris finished his gusty oration, he announced that Mr. Peters would deliver the "proper address," and Mr. Peters came forward and did so. In the beginning he acknowledged being a young man who never did anything but that which was for his own benefit; but, by a stretch of imagination, said that the man who would not work for his own benefit would not work for his country's benefit. Mr. Peters' motto evidently is, "Self first, and country afterwards." He objected to being called a political baby, and consoled himself with the hope that he would not, politically speaking, die young. He then objected to the time for holding the election. It was, he thought, an outrage that fishermen should be considered in the matter. There were "only about 5,000 of them fellows," and for their sake the whole country should be inconvenienced. He next turned his attention to the finances of the Province. Here he proved himself to be an apt pupil of Sir Richard Cartwright. His estimates were ludicrous. He cited figures deficits with the same agility as Sir Richard. In fact he reminded us of the boy who endeavored to work out this problem:

"If a cat falls into a well sixty feet deep, and crawls out six feet each day, falling back eight feet every night, how much time would the cat require to get out of the well?"

The boy after a great deal of ciphering, covered both sides of his slate with figures; then placed one edge of the slate on his knees, and resting his chin on the other, gazed into vacancy.

"Well, John, how about the cat?"

"Father, I ain't got any more room on the slate, but if I had another square, I'd have that cat out in—1 in three minutes."

Mr. Peters' mode of reckoning deficits was like unto this boy's style of "figuring up" the cat. He did not wish to detain his audience, or in ten minutes, he would swamp the Province with a deficit. Leaving finances alone, he struck out on the Fishery Award. It was an easy matter to get this. Messrs. Peters, Morris, Farquharson & Co., if elected, had only to demand it and it was forthcoming. Delivered of this idea, he attempted to take his seat; but the chairman brought him to task for not touching on Winter Communication and regular mails. He spoke on the subject as the chairman ordered, and then took his seat amid faint applause.

Charles Herzog, Esq., ex-Governor Laird, W. D. Stewart, D. Farquharson and Henry Beer, Esqs., also addressed the meeting. Their cry was "Let us in."

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Home Rule for Ireland.

Costigan's Resolution Carried.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

Ottawa, April 21.

Sir Charles Tupper gave notice to-day of a motion granting one hundred and fifty thousand dollars of an annual subsidy to the Chignecto Ship Railway Company.

Mr. Costigan, M. P., in an able speech, moved the Home Rule resolutions, a large number of the members of the Irish National Land League were present, and the galleries were crowded.

Mr. Blake made a lengthy speech in reply, and—

Sir John followed, ably supporting Mr. Costigan. He said the persons imprisoned in British prisons for political offences should be released, and concluded by earnestly appealing to the supporters of the Government to vote for the resolutions.

Mr. Brecken spoke warmly in favor of the resolutions, and asked for Ireland the same form of Government as is enjoyed by Canada.

Mr. Mills made a philosophical speech, and was followed by Anglin, who eulogized the present Imperial Government.

The motion was carried unanimously.

Mr. Muttart, M. P., King's County, gave notice of motion asking for copies of petitions relating to the East Point Railway.

GENERAL NEWS.

London, April 20.

Charles Robert Darwin, a well known scientist is dead. He died at his residence, Down House, near Orpington. Darwin had been ill some days, and was supposed to be recovering, but had a relapse on Tuesday and never rallied.

In the Commons to-night during the debate on the recent circular in regard to Clifford Lloyd, and concerning the duty of self-protection, Mr. Redmond persisted in denouncing Mr. Foster as dishonest. The speaker named him, and his suspension was ordered by a vote of 207 to 12. Redmond, therefore withdrew.

GLOUCESTER, April 20.

Steamer "Cheffee" reports that on the downward passage she passed a Nova Scotia coaster on her beam ends off Half-way rock, but could not get the name. Her deck load of wood was floating about. The schooner "Golden Rule," of Rockport, was alongside, and a dory put into Nahant, probably to telegraph to Boston for tugs.

CALCUTTA, April 20.

Political masses have recommenced in Monday.

King Thobaw has put to death an inferior wife, two half-sisters, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, and fifty-three relatives.

LONDON, April 20.

In the trial of McLean, the would-be assassin of the Queen, yesterday, the Superintendent of Salisbury and Broadmoor Asylums testified to McLean's insanity. The jury returned a verdict of not guilty on the ground of insanity. McLean is to remain in custody during Her Majesty's pleasure.
