

# Ont. Farmer Is Released After Quarrel Over Taxes

OWEN SOUND, Ont. (CP)—Fred Fawcett, 50-year-old farmer who was confined to a mental hospital for almost four years, has returned to his farm at nearby Euphrasia Township.

Rita Fawcett, a sister, said in an interview here that her brother was released Friday and returned to his home.

Fawcett was committed to the Penitentiary Hospital for the criminally insane in September, 1961, after incidents that arose from a refusal to pay taxes on his land.

He refused to pay the taxes after Euphrasia Township officials provided a request that a service be provided for all other farmers in the district.

The six-foot, 250-pound farmer said at the time that a Crown grant title to his land, dated 1856, rendered him immune to taxation. It was this belief that caused the Crown to declare there was evidence of delusional insanity.

Two accusations led to his confinement in the mental hospital.

The first occurred on Aug. 28, 1961, when it was alleged Fawcett pointed a pistol at two elderly tax assessors and shot a hole through the front tire of their car.

The second, on Sept. 18, 1961, alleged that he holed up in his farmhouse and threatened to shoot a posse of provincial police who came to arrest him.

Fawcett said this was a gross distortion of the facts.

"All my life I have avoided

the use of violence," he said in an interview. "Either with firearms or with my fists."

"It's insulting to suggest I would use firearms or any other form of violence against two weak, elderly men. I'd be ashamed of myself if I acted that way. Do you realize I could pick up both of these men with one hand?"

Instead of being tried on the two charges, he was remanded by a magistrate's court in Owen Sound for a mental examination. He was later declared insane and committed to the hospital.

Although it was reported as recently as a month ago that Fawcett still had delusions and was too dangerous to be at large, he was finally released.

"I feel exactly as I did three months ago or six months ago," he said. "I have never worried about my insanity nor have I had any doubts about it."

Barry B. Swadron, secretary of Ontario's advisory committee on the detention of patients, said his committee was "aware" of Fawcett's release but not responsible for it.

"It was a domestic decision on the part of Dr. B. A. Boyd, the hospital superintendent," he said. "Neither our committee nor anyone in the government made the decision. It was based solely on Dr. Boyd's medical judgment."

Mr. Swadron referred to Mr. Fawcett's release as "absence on probation."

He said his committee, acting as a review board, "will come

## Pesticide Level Agreement Made

OTTAWA (CP)—After six years of study, scientists from eight countries have agreed how much pesticide may safely remain in food reaching the consumer.

The scientists have just completed a two-week meeting in Rome which a Canadian agriculture official terms "far-reaching importance."

Dr. Henry Hurtig, research co-ordinator (pesticides) for the federal agriculture department, commented following release of a statement here and in Rome.

The eight scientists comprise the working party on pesticide residues of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations. They reviewed the status of 14 pesticides used to safeguard cereals against pests during production, storage and processing.

Dr. Hurtig said in an interview the group has "worked six years towards this agreement." Its recommendations will go before a meeting of government representatives at The Hague in January, 1966.

The final contract was due to a misunderstanding in the bidding. The two club bid was fairly standard and showed a very powerful hand. The two

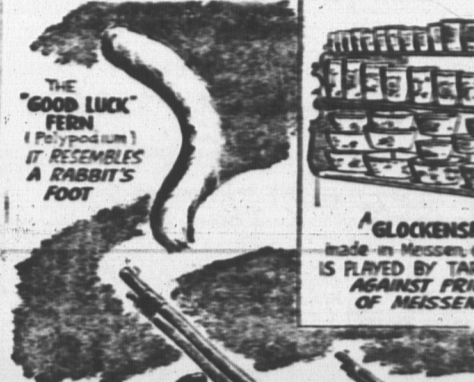
