Enforcement Of Grade Regulations

Aunt Jimma Makes Hit At Atkinson's

Strict enforcement of the regulations regarding showing the proper grades of fruits and vegetables sold here will be undertaken, it was emphasized yesterday by Mr. W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture. He stated that an examination of some fruits and vegetables indicated the dealers were treating the regulations more or less as a joke and referred particularly to potatoes and carrots. Some consumers had been calling Government offices in the past two or three days to complain about the vegetables purchased in stores. Certain fruits and vegetables must be marked clearly with grade and cards are available for that purpose at the Department of Agriculture. Bins or boxes must be marked properly. But Mr. Shaw was of the opinion that the whole scheme of improvement will be more efficient if everybody works towards its accomplishment. Mr. Shaw urged that storekeepers get their cards immediately and grade their products.

hold of a new day—a day which could mean a new prosperity and new benefits to most of our people. Many well-known economists considered New Brunswick "the coning province," Mr. Fortin continued. "It is, therefore, a critical time for all of us. Our future prosperity depends upon what care we take of the resources and opportunities which an all-wise Providence has entrusted to us." Fred A. McCain (PC-Carleton) seconding the address, also referred to the base metal discoveries near Bathurst. They had given the people "a feeling of optimism which has been lacking for a good many years. Let us fervently pray that this may be at long last a boon to our economy." With reference to New Brunswick's potato industry, Mr. McCain said growers were suffering hardships because of currency restrictions and tariff barriers. This, coupled with increasing freight rates, had resulted in the growers' position "deteriorating annually" and vigorous action to improve the matter was long overdue. The customary throne speech debate, which usually takes about two weeks, was dispensed with. After Mr. McCain's remarks, Mr. Taylor said that in a desire to cooperate with the government and facilitate the sessional work, the Opposition did not intend to submit an amendment to the motion for adoption of the address in reply to the throne speech, and also did not intend to debate the motion. The House adjourned until next Tuesday. At the outset of the proceedings, Dr. E.T. Kennedy (PC-Kings) was appointed speaker.

dependence, union with Egypt or a partnership in the British Commonwealth before the end of 1956. The agreement provides for these three main stages: 1. Elections to be held within the next two months for a Sudanese parliament. 2. A Sudanese government will be formed, and under international supervision, will prepare for the assumption of full power. 3. Within three years, the Sudanese people will make their choice for independence or an alliance. Safeguards were written into the accord at the insistence of Britain to protect the rights of the pagan Negro minority living in the Sudan's deep south. Most of the northerners are Moslem Arabs.

Troops Volunteers

British embassies abroad, Italy and Portugal offered their own planes to help in the airlift and Belgium is shipping 500,000 sandbags by sea. On England's crippled east coast more than 14,000 troops Thursday beat back the first tidal threat. On Canvey Island near the mouth of the Thames, troops watched uneasily as gale-driven breakers drove within two feet of the top of the row of sandbags. At Sutton-on-Sea, waves up to 12 feet high crashed over the seawall and flooded the streets again. The wall stood fast. Holland Threatened If the northeast winds slash across the English channel today, they may drive the swollen North Sea into flooding the vital province of South Holland, where 2,000,000 persons live. The province includes The Hague and Rotterdam, with its vital industries and rich truckgarden lands. Meanwhile, near Sheffield a tractor was rushing bread, milk and oxygen to a hospital marooned for more than 36 hours in Lancashire, five buses were buried in eight-foot drifts. In the western Atlantic a 75-mile gale hurled huge waves against France's southwest coast. No ships moved in the port of Bayonne.

Russia Drops Neutral Role

However, lies between Israel and the U.S. have been close. Some time last year the Kremlin gave up any hopes of building a new Middle Eastern policy on the basis of pro-Communism in Israel. Several months ago anti-Semitism in the Communist bloc, most dramatically demonstrated by purge trials in Prague, took the specific form of anti-Zionism, that is, opposition to the Zionist movement to resettle the Jews in Palestine. Experts on Soviet policy here believe that the Kremlin's anti-Zionist policies are due primarily to fear and hatred of the attraction which Zionism holds for Jews living within Russia and the satellite countries. But they say it might also be a bid for closer relations with the Arabs. The actual break in relations between Moscow and Tel Aviv was made by Russia Wednesday after the Soviet legation at Tel Aviv had been bombed and despite an apology from the Israeli government.
