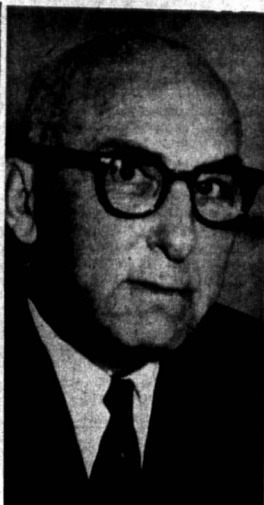


# Death Yesterday Of New Brunswick Senator

GRAND FALLS, N.B. (CP)—A heart seizure today ended the 26-year political career of Senator Frederick William Pirie and reduced the 102-seat Senate to 84 members.

The 3-year-old Liberal senator from Victoria-Carleton died in the offices of F. W. Pirie Co. Ltd., a potato growing and marketing firm of which he was president.

His death, the fifth in Senate ranks this year, increased the number of vacancies to 18. Present standing is Liberals, 76; Progressive Conservatives, 5; Independent Liberal, 1 and Independent, 2.

**BUSINESS PIONEER**  
Senator Pirie was born in Red Rapids, N.B. and gained firm foothold in New Brunswick business as a pioneer in opening Central and South American markets to New Brunswick potatoes.

His climb to the Canadian Senate began with his election as an alderman and later mayor of this northern New Brunswick town in the upper St. John River Valley. He entered the political arena at the provincial level in 1930, winning a seat for the opposition Liberals in the legislature.

With the defeat of the Progressive Conservative government in 1935, he became provincial minister of lands and mines, a post he retained until appointed to the Senate in 1945.

His speeches were seldom polished but always forceful. While in the legislature, he was the champion of the potato farmer and based his campaigns for re-election on problems facing the province's \$20,000,000 industry.

**FLYING MINISTER**  
From 1939, he often shuttled to business and government conferences in his four-passenger seaplane, a practise that earned him the title New Brunswick's flying minister.

He was fond of hunting but devoted to conservation. It was as lands minister that he introduced the closed season on moose in 1936 which is still in existence.

Senator Pirie was a graduate of Mount Allison University. He began his business career in the lumbering industry, later became an automobile distributor and finally joined his father in family potato business which was later merged into the present company.

He was a director of the Maritime Trust Company, the Maritime Life Insurance Co. and the Canadian Cement Co. and president of the Atlantic Chemical Co.

In Ottawa, Solicitor-General Macdonald, government leader in the Senate said "I was greatly shocked to learn of the sudden passing of Senator Pirie."

"He had brought our deliberations in the Senate boundless energy and a wealth of experience gained during a life devoted to the development of natural resources in his native province. I extend to his widow and family my sincere sympathy in the great loss which they have sustained."

**PSYCHIATRISTS**  
The recent convention of Psychiatrists in Charlottetown suggests that the time is coming when it will be routine procedure for every patient entering a hospital (or consulting a doctor) to be interviewed by his psychiatrist as well as his medical doctor. (A psychiatrist is a physician who has specialized in mental and emotional disorders).

At one session of the convention, peptic ulcers were discussed from the view-point of the medical doctor and the psychiatrist by a member of each of the professions. From experience most of us believe that a head-ache or an "upset stomach" can come from fear, worry etc.

But even where there seems no relationship the psychiatrist can improve our attitude toward our illness and thus hasten recovery. Good general physicians have always done this but have had to concentrate on the disease itself. The psychiatrist devotes his entire attention to the psychological aspects of the patient. He
