

DISCREPANCIES NOTED

BOARD NEEDS POLICING WHEN HIRING POLICE

Discrepancies have appeared in the Personnel Board hirings of Student Police. Two of the applicants have even written letters to the chairperson, Monica Driscoll concerning the Board's recommendations.

Four of the students, John Neville, Sharon Horne, Sue Hornby, and Caroline Hill, who were rejected, all had previous experience. Some of the new student police have no previous experience.

Not only do they have

no previous experience, but one was expelled from Residence two years ago and is not allowed back; another is on probation on Residence (that is, any trouble and he gets kicked out) and was a cause for a don in Bernadine almost having to call the Security Police; and another has had trouble with the Narcotics Control Act.

If one looks back a week, one will remember the Chief of Student Police, Gordon Coffin, had to resign as Student Council speaker due to "conflict of

interests." However, two student police, Gerald Mc Kenna and Alan Hilton, (who are hired by the Personnel Board) are members of the Personnel Board.

Many of the applicants had used Gordon Coffin as

a reference. Coffin said that he was never contacted about the hirings.

This is not saying that Personnel Board is not doing their job (for people are being hired) but that they are not doing it well.

NEW BOARD MEMBERS APPOINTED

CHARLOTTETOWN (IIS) --- Executive Council has approved two new appointments to the UPEI Board of Governors and renewed the appointment of J. Edmond Arsenault.

The new appointees are Everett Baker of Sherwood, replacing James Gyrus; and Mrs. Roberta Hublely of Montague, replacing Dr. Tom Hall.

The University Act provides

for a Board of Governors of eighteen persons, nine of whom are appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council.

The other current government appointees are Hon. C. St. Clair Trainor, Dr. Kenneth Grant, Wilbert McInnis, Ronald Hickey, James Larkin, and Philip Matheson.

Appointments are for a three-year term.
