CANADIAN WIMBLEDON

Success of the Members of the Island Team.

Special despatch to the Examiner

OTTAWA, Sept. 6.

The shooting began to-day at 10 a. m. the wind blowing hard. Three hundred competitors were on the grounds. In the all-comers match—seven rounds at five hundred yards—the first prize was won by Capt. Nelson, of Halifax, thirty-three points, and the second prize by Sergeant Davison, of Charlottetown, thirty-two points. Lieut. D. Stepper, Sergt. Younker and Sapper L. Hopper, also took good prizes.

AFGHANISTAN.

OFFICIAL ACCOUNT OF GEN. ROBERTS' VICTORY OVER AYOOB KHAN'S FORCES.

LONDON, Sept. 5.

The following despatch has been received from Gen. Roberts, giving details of his victory over Ayoub Khan:

"Candahar, Sept. 2.—The report of reconnaissance carried out by Gen. Hugh Gough and Col. Chapman on 31st ult., afforded me all necessary information regarding the enemy's position. I found it quite practicable to turn his right and thus place myself to the rear of Babawali Range, where Ayoub Khan's main camp was. I decided on doing so, and commenced the attack shortly after 9 o'clock yesterday morning. To cover my designs I made preparations for a direct attack upon Babawali and this point was entrusted to the troops of the Candahar garrison under Gen. Primrose, who also arranged to occupy my advanced positions of the previous day. At the same time the cavalry brigade under Gen. Hugh Gough advanced upon the left and without difficulty reached Argand Ab, where it was well placed for pursuit, should the enemy break either towards Sirishk or Kakrez. The attack was made by the first and second brigades under Generals McPherson and Baker, respectively, with the third brigade under Gen. McGregor in support.

THE WHOLE INFANTRY

being under command of General Ross. An elevated village within 1,200 yards of our position was strongly held by the enemy, and had first to be taken. This was done in a most gallant manner by the 92nd Highlanders and 2nd Ghorkas, covered by artillery.

"Two brigades then advanced through orchards and enclosures, fighting steadily, the left of the second brigade being brought gradually round until the village of Pirspainal was reached. At this point the enemy was in great force and fought most resolutely, but nothing could resist the determined advance of the British troops. Shortly after this, the reserve slope of Baba Wali was reached, and the standing camp of Ayoub Khan became visible. All the enemy's attempts to stem the torrent were futile. By 12 o'clock, noon, the camp was in our possession, with 27 pieces of ordnance, which included our own guns lost on the 27th of July.

"The casualties, in addition to those yesterday reported, included three officers of cavalry slightly wounded, namely Major Willock, Lt. Baker and Lt. Neville Chamberlain. The 92nd and Highlanders had 51 wounded, three of whom since died. The 72nd had 17 wounded, of whom 6 died. Among the native troops, 11 were killed and 72 wounded. The total number of wounded is about 210.

"The cavalry brigade marches to-morrow to Kokeran, where it will be placed, and this will facilitate supplies being brought into the city. The 19th Bombay infantry, with the 3rd Bombay cavalry, will march to-morrow, to open up communication with Gen. Phayre, to whom I am writing, requesting him not to push on too many troops, but to utilize his transport as much as possible in the conveyance of stores and supplies."

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Sept. 4.

In the Commons, on a motion to go into committee on the appropriation bill, Parnell's amendment was rejected by a vote of 58 to 23.

An amendment moved by Dillon, tacking the compensation for disturbance bill on the appropriation, was rejected by a vote of 60 to 18.

A debate arose on O'Connor's amendment, throwing out the item for salaries in the House of Lords. Sir Vernon Harcourt, Home Secretary, said Lord Redesdale had indicated that the House of Lords rejected the registration bill to save the seats of Tory members. John Bright said it happened that while the Commons were endeavoring to conciliate Ireland, the House of Lords were determined to make a declaration of war against the Irish. Mr. Aylmer, Conservative member for Maidstone, declared that Mr. Bright's speech was suppressed treason against the constitution. The amendment was rejected by a vote of 81 to 18.

The appropriation bill then passed in committee.

Previous to this Philip Callan, Home member for Louth, in a speech on home local grievances, spoke of the infidel members of the House, and of the intolerant, ignorant Presbyterians. He refused to retract and was suspended for the remainder of the sitting. He had the appearance of being intoxicated. After some difficulty he was induced to quit the House, and retired bowing, smiling and kissing his hand.

LONDON, Sept. 4.

The "Daily Telegraph" reports that a preliminary treaty of peace has been signed

at Lima. The following are its principal articles: Peru surrenders the monitors Monocapac and Atahuapla, razes the fortifications of Callao, surrenders all the artillery of Callao, engages not to augment her navy for 20 years, and will reimburse to Chili the cost of the war. Chili engages to pay half the exterior debt of Peru.

St. PETERSBURG, Sept. 4.

With reference to the reports of the alleged plots to take the life of the Czar while on his way to Livadia, a Moscow paper states that a policeman, a fortnight ago, found the inmates of a small house near the Charkoff Railway engaged in excavations. They said they were making a cellar. Search was made, and when it was discovered that they had begun to make a tunnel towards the railway, the diggers disappeared.

CHILIAN INTENTIONS.—The latest news from the Chili Peruvian war comes from Valparaiso, via London, and is to the effect that Chili proposes to annex Bolivia and retain Taharaco until Peru pays an indemnity.

THEREAU, the man arrested for the murder of Miss Hill, at Annapolis, N. S., is a man in good circumstances. He could give no explanation of his whereabouts on the day of the murder. An attempt was made to assassinate him as he was being imprisoned on the 4th.

GOOD NEWS.—We learn upon good authority that should an appeal be taken from the decision of the Supreme Court of Canada, which, however, is not very probable, the Dominion Government will employ counsel to argue in favor of the "Canada Temperance Act, 1878."

The Stipendiary Magistrate having returned to the city after a brief absence, had a goodly number of cases for his attention at the Court yesterday morning. Patrick McCourt, who was arrested for damaging and destroying property belonging to Mrs. R. B. Peake, was fined \$10 and costs and ordered to pay \$15 for damages. James Murphy, arrested for stealing a chain from Messrs. Rubin & Hart, was sentenced to six months imprisonment with hard labor. James Burns, summoned for assaulting Donald Farquharson, was fined five dollars and costs. A boy, named Charles McEwen, arrested for the larceny of a box of cigars, was further remanded to jail. Peter McGeigan, arrested for assaulting Alexander McGeigan, was dismissed. To-day John Murphy was fined \$16 and costs, for selling liquor without license. Alonzo Manthorn, summoned for stealing cucumbers from Mr. Peter DesBrisay, was dismissed. Joseph McDonald and William McVane were summoned for cruelty to a horse. McDonald was fined \$15 and costs, and McVane was dismissed.
