

Junior Season Opens As Rangers, PVI Tie 6-All

The 1966-67 Junior Hockey season was officially opened by Ivan Doherty last night after a one minute silence in remembrance of a former PVI player, Kenzie Steele, killed in an accident last summer.

Paul Gallant scored at 16:03 of the third period last night to bring the Provincial Vocational Institute into a 6-5 tie with defending champions Rogers Rangers in the first game of the 1966-67 Junior Hockey season at the Charlottetown Forum.

The score came while Ranger Walsh was in the penalty box serving an elbowing penalty. On a three man rush, the Institute's Gallant, Stanley, and McCarron pulled goalie Francis McNally ten feet out of the net after walking around the Ranger defence and on pass from Stanley, Gallant slipped the puck past the goalie and into the net on the short side.

In this high scoring game, the Rangers got off to a quick start when Freeman MacKenzie came from behind the net and scored an unassisted goal on PVI netminder John Reid from a hard angle at the 4:46 mark of the opening period. Within a matter

of seconds, the Rangers added another to their total on a similar play on the same left hand side of the net when Allison MacLean, assisted by number 6, Newton scored at the 5:13 mark.

For the first three quarters of the first period the Rangers dominated the play and carried the puck at will into the PVI zone, walking all over the disorganized club but in the closing minutes of the period, the Institute boys took the initiative and began a close checking game which kept the Rangers from organizing an effective offence. They maintained this style throughout most of the game, at times completely neutralizing the Ranger style.

Pay dirt came for PVI at 16:53 when Paul Gallant collected his first of the night off passes from Jean Paul Cyr and Ted Kitson on a power play with Rangers Ron Carmichael serving a holding penalty. Three minutes later, with seventeen seconds left in the period, Gary McCarron tied the score to finish off the period on another power play goal assisted by Stanley and Kitson.

The next two periods was the same routine, with the Rangers making a fast start only to let PVI through later for another score. In the second period, Rex MacCarville scored in the second minute on a pass from left to right across the PVI goalmouth from MacKenzie with Newton picking up another point on the play for feeding the puck from the corner.

The Rangers died after the early second period start under the fierce checking of freshmen coach Jack Heintz's students and his club again found the range to pot two quick goals within thirty seconds midway through the period when Stanley picked the puck out of a scramble in front of McNally and shoved it home for an unassisted goal. Off the faceoff MacCarroll scored from ten feet out on a short pass from Stanley giving the Institute the lead for the first time in the game.

Going into the third period with a 4-3 deficit, the Rangers scored at the 4:08 mark on a slapshot from the point by Bob Stewart which hit Reid's pads and bounced into the net to tie the game at 4-4. Three minutes and five seconds later, in a melee before PVI's net, Les Barnes scored unassisted to give the lead back to the Rangers.

PVI was back to tie six and a half minutes later when Jean Paul Cyr came up with the most beautiful play of the evening, walking from a faceoff at his own blue line through the entire Ranger crop to score unassisted and again tie the score.

St. Dunstan's University Saints open their 1966-67 season tomorrow against Shearwater Flyers during the Alumni Weekend, but the club can rest with the assurance that they play for keeps when the league schedule opens the following week.

Saturday, the Saints meet the older and more experienced Navy team from Shearwater which has been practicing for more than six weeks. The Saints have been on the ice for only ten days, but already, Coach Jack Kane has molded a formidable lineup from the thirty-one tryouts at training camp.

Kane has six players back from last year's squad, which finished in second place behind St. F.X. Vince Mulligan, Blaine Jewell, Carl McQuaid, Mike Kelly, Glen Hughes and Rick O'Donoghue.

However, he's lost Maurice Roy and Gordie Whitlock among the forwards, and this put a dent into the offensive thrust. Roy was second high scorer in the league with 20 goals, and Whitlock, fifth high scorer, accounted for 15.

Among the new players are seven graduates of the High School team. They are Mike Brown in goal, Brian MacIntyre and Wayne MacDougall on defense, and Bill LeClair, Allan Flood, and Billy MacKinnon, forwards. Other prospects include John Morrison, Centre, Paul MacWilliams, right wing, and Bill Noonan, defenceman.

Kane considers that the team should have more depth and experience, although it will be difficult to improve on the scoring of last year's team. "All our players from last year's team have more experience and knowhow in the league," said

Kane, now starting his fifth year as coach, "and the High School students have played on two Maritime Championship teams. In Paul MacWilliams, we have one of the best junior players in the Maritimes, and our other first year players also have experience. We have a lot of work ahead of us before meeting Dal, but we'll be ready."

Saturday's game starts at 3:00 as part of the Alumni Weekend activities. The Varsity basketball team meets St. John Schooners at 1:30 in the gym.

Winning the most dashes at Sackville Downs during the 1966 season was Eric "Ike" Moreside, Charlottetown trainer-driver.

"Ike" had 294 drives at the Nova Scotia oval, was first 52 times, second 41 times, had 46 thirds and 50 fourths.

Midnight Bold, a four-year-old, helped Moreside gain his outstanding success. Midnight Bold was first in 20 trips and took a mark of 2:06.2.

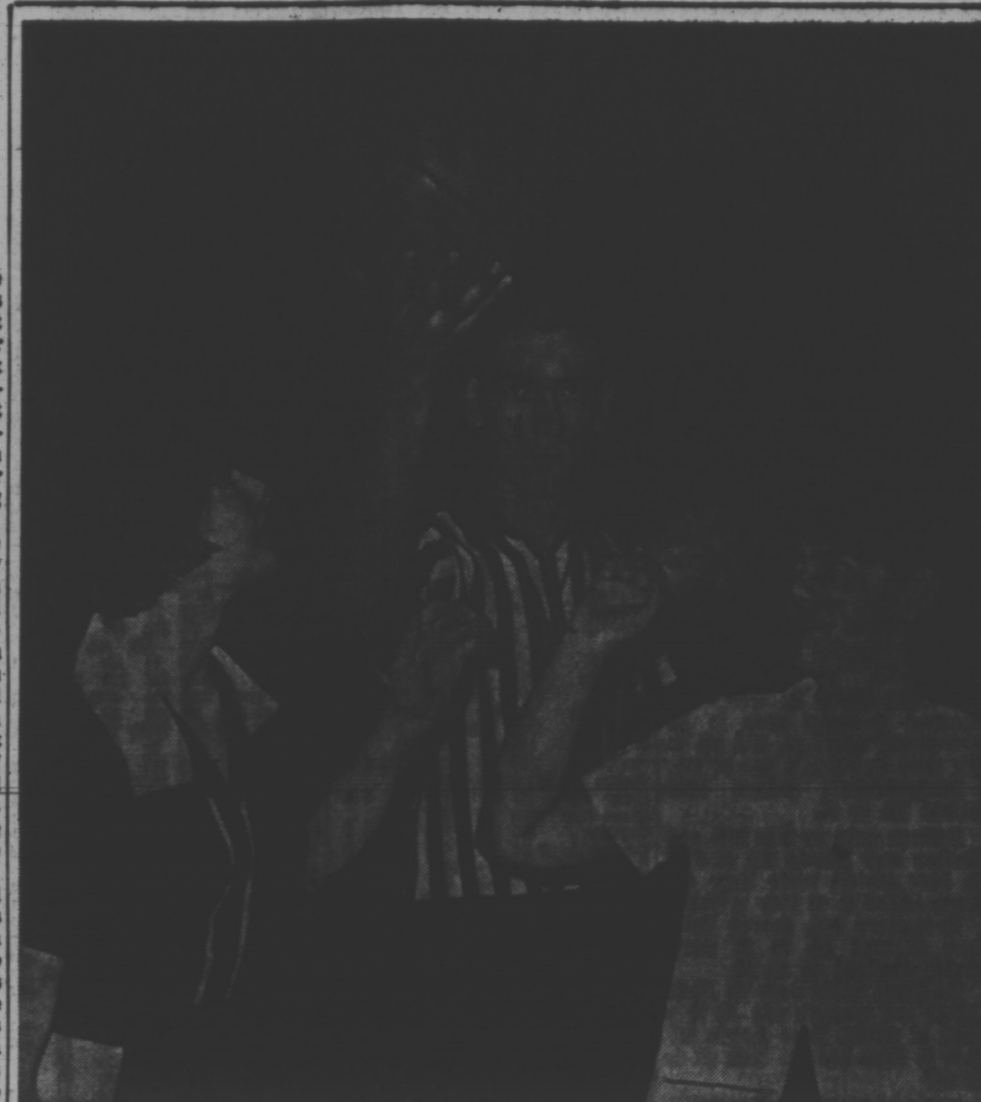
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SEASON OPENER

Saskatchewan Takes Lion's Share Of WFC Honors

WINNIPEG (CP) - Saskatchewan Roughriders dominated the 1966 all-star team in the Western Football Conference with 10 players, eight of them on offence.

Fullback George Reed, flanker Hugh Campbell and centre Ted Urness led the Roughriders in the balloting. They were among five unanimous choices and all three are repeaters.

Other members of the Roughriders, who finished first in the WFC schedule this season, making the team were quarterback Ron Lancaster, offensive guards Al Benecick and Jack Abendschan, offensive tackle Jerry Brock, offensive end Jim Worden, defensive end Garner Ekstran and defensive halfback Bob Kosid.

The team, selected by sports writers and broadcasters in the five WFC cities, also named five all-stars from Winnipeg Blue Bombers, five from Cal-

gary Stampede, three from Edmonton Eskimos and two from British Columbia Lions.

Twenty-five players were named. Abendschan tied with Tom Hinton of the Lions for the offensive guard spot.

Twelve of the all-stars are repeaters. Other Saskatchewan returnees were Benecick, Brock and Ekstran. Offensive halfbacks Dave Rainey of Winnipeg and Jim Thomas of Edmonton, offensive tackle Frank Rigney of Winnipeg, defensive tackle Mike Cacic of B.C., middle linebacker Wayne Harris and defensive halfback Gerry Keeling, both of Calgary, were also chosen to the 1965 team.

TWO WERE UNANIMOUS
Rainey and Thomas were also unanimous choices. There were no unanimous selections to the defensive squad although Harris came within one vote and Ulmer two.

Lancaster, who replaced Winnipeg's Kenny Ploen as all-star quarterback, was the West's nominee for the 1966 outstanding player award in the Canadian Football League. He was defeated for the honor by Russ Jackson of Ottawa's Rough Riders, a former team-mate of Lancaster at Ottawa.

Ploen was the only other quarterback named by the voters and he finished well behind Lancaster.

Campbell actually was a vote short of being a unanimous choice at flanker, but that selector named him to the team as an end and named Ken Nelson of Winnipeg the flanker.

Ekstran had a close fight for his defensive end spot, edging Bill Whisler of Winnipeg by one vote.

Evanshen, in his second year in the CFL, was an all-star last year when he was with Montreal Alouettes of the Eastern Conference. He made the 1965 EPC team as a flanker.

Saskatchewan owed much of its success in finishing first to the hard-charging play of its offensive line. It was reflected in the all-star voting with the Roughriders taking four of the five positions along the interior of the line—Urness at centre, Benecick and Abendschan at guard and Brock at tackle. ONLY Rigney, who won the other tackle spot, and Hinton, who tied Brock, cracked the Saskatchewan monopoly.

ANTIGONISH, N.S. (CP) - St. Francis Xavier X-Men, top dogs in Maritime intercollegiate football since the mid-1960s and ranked fifth among Canadian colleges, are out to disprove any "Upper Canadian" notions that football in the Atlantic Provinces is behind the rest of the country.

The Waterloo team was ranked third in Canada by a poll of more than 60 sports writers, athletic directors and coaches. Both teams have undefeated records this season.

Coach Don Loney of the X-Men says of Saturday's game: "I really don't have a true picture of our opposition and the only guarantee I am prepared to make... is that Toronto fans will see the best football that we are capable of playing."

Star of the team is Paul Brule, a 185-pound fullback from Ottawa. Brule, a junior at St. Francis Xavier, set an individual conference record this season with 128 points.

Rough Riders Confident But Are Not Taking Chances

OTTAWA (CP) - Ottawa Rough Riders are confident they'll be in Vancouver Nov. 26 to meet Saskatchewan Roughriders for the Grey Cup but they're not taking anything for granted.

Fullback Jim Dillard says the 28-point lead in the total-point series with Hamilton Tiger-Cats is a nice cushion but not big enough to allow the Riders to take things easy in the final game of the set at Montreal Saturday. Ottawa won the series opener 30-1 in Hamilton Sunday.

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Cats Must Replace Henley On Defence

HAMILTON (CP) - Hamilton Tiger-Cats Thursday prepared to catch an overnight train to Montreal and coach Ralph Szabo spent the day trying to decide on a replacement for defensive halfback Garney Henley.

The Ticats meet Ottawa Rough Riders in the second game of the two-game, total-point series for the Eastern Football Conference title Saturday in Montreal and they'll do it without Henley. He pulled a hamstring muscle in Sunday's opening game, won 30-1 by Ottawa. Although he is making the trip he won't play.

The game, starting at 2 p.m. EST and carried nationally on the CBC television network, is being played at Montreal's Expo Stadium because Ottawa's Lansdowne Park is undergoing renovations.

Szabo must figure out some way to generate more offence among his Ticats than they've shown in recent games and at the same time stop quarterback Russ Jackson of Ottawa, named the outstanding player in the country this week.

"Nobody could have stopped Jackson the way he played last Sunday," Szabo said. "I just hope he doesn't have two games in a row like that."

ACCURATE PASSER
Jackson, passing with pinpoint accuracy, led the Ottawa attack by completing 21 of 28 tosses.

Szabo also is concerned with stopping fullback Jim Dillard, who scored a touchdown and rushed for 118 yards last Sunday.

"It's Dillard who really makes things complicated for the defence," said Szabo. "He's their fullback and he has the size and power to do that job but he's not really a fullback because he's fast and is an excellent receiver. He is a half-back, too. You can't defend against him as if he were a full-back."

Szabo plans to start Joe Zager at quarterback but said he'll insert backup man Frank Cosentino, if needed.

Last year, fewer than 2,000 fans showed up at Toronto's Varsity Stadium to see University of Toronto Blues defeat University of Alberta Golden Bears 14-7.

So far, officials report more than 13,000 tickets have been sold for the contest, starting at 3 p.m. EST.

Coach Don Loney's St. Francis Xavier squad, winners of the Bluebonnet Conference championship, arrived Thursday.

Waterloo Lutheran is the winner of the Ontario Intercollegiate title.

Proceeds of the game go to the Canadian Save the Children Fund.

At stake is the Vanier Cup.

HAS INJURY

"We didn't get much out of it," Knight said. "We really don't have much to go on. Normally we stay on the ground more than we pass, but we know they're big and tough to run against so we'll probably try to throw on Saturday."

Terry Dolan proved himself cool and accurate in the X-Men's win over St. Mary's University Huskies last Saturday to clinch the Bluebonnet title. St. Mary's had captured the league title for the first time last year.

Loney, who joined St. FX in 1947, has a fair selection of talent to draw from in composing his winning teams.

The University has a registration of 3,000 students from 35 countries. The backbone of their football squad is normally drawn from students from Ontario, Quebec and the United States. A 100,000 athletic centre being completed on the main campus here is expected to further boost the college's athletic fame.
