CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

Appointment of a New Park Keeper and Other Matters Considered.

The only member absent last night was Councillor Horne. Mayor Warburton presided and the Recorder was also in his place.

After routine, Councillor Crabbe explained that he was not ready to report regarding the appointment of an electrical inspector and one or two other matters standing over. Regarding an electrical inspector he informed the Board that there is no such officer in either Halifax or St. John. Councillor Crabbe also explained that there were several amounts in taxes appearing in the city reports each year which seemed impossible to collect and which he thought it advisable to write off. He therefore moved the following resolution:

Resolved That the City Clerk be authorized to write off the following taxes, viz. real estate for year 1898, \$1,696.63; 1879, \$1,741.73; 1880, \$1,023.30; 1881, \$90.62; 1882, \$47.45; 1883, \$70.68; 1884, \$143.66; 1885, \$175.30; 1886, \$76. Personal property for the year 1889, \$151.79; 1890, \$372.88; poll taxes for year 1889, \$640.

The motion carried. Councillor Hooper moved, seconded by Councillor Taylor, that John McQuillan be dismissed from the position of park keeper and Thos. Costello be appointed in his stead, the appointment to take effect on the 1st November and Mrs. McQuillan to have the use of the house at the park until the 1st May, 1899.

In the discussion which followed Councillor Hooper said he understood that McQuillan was not giving satisfaction, and Councillor McCarron expressed the opinion that Costello would not be any improvement upon the present keeper.

Upon being put to a vote, the motion was declared lost, only Councillors Hooper and Taylor appearing for it.

Councillor Nicholson then moved that Thomas Costello be given employment as teamster at \$1 a day from this time forth. Councillor Lyons seconded the motion, which carried, Councillors Crabbe, Wheatley and McCarron dissenting.

In connection with the motion there was considerable discussion regarding work upon the streets, in the course of which Councillor Crabbe pointed out that the appropriation for this purpose was exhausted, and called upon the Mayor, who had to sign the checks, to protect the Finance Committee in this matter. As for Costello he was disposed to give him work when it was to be done, but he did not think it was right to engage men permanently when there was practically nothing for them to do.

Meeting adjourned.

Local and Other Items.

To-night.—The "Devil's Auction" Co., opens at the Opera House to-night.

A WINGED PRIZE.—On Wednesday last, the 5th inst, Mr John Reynolds, of Reynolds' Island, Murray Harbor, killed a golden eagle, whose wings when extended measured nine feet from tip to tip.

LIQUOR REGULATION ACT.—Two summonses charging violations of the Liquor Regulation Act were served yesterday. The recipients were Michael Carragher, corner of Richmond and Pownal streets, and William Ewing, corner of King and Pownal streets. Both summonses are returnable on Monday.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon three children charged with annoying persons in their dwellings were dismissed, and a similar prosecution against three other young ones was adjourned until the 14th. An assault case was disposed of for a fine of 5 cents and costs, the prosecutor declining to prosecute.

FRUIT GROWERS.—Mr. D. A. Sharp, who is a well known dealer in the best kinds of fruit trees, is now taking orders. BEER GOING UP.—A Montreal despatch says: Owing to present high price of hops and malt, brewers say beer will likely go up about a \$1 a barrel, and saloon keepers have either to increase price of glass or reduce its size. There is a general scarcity in the hop crop, and prices have gone up 3c a pound. Malt is selling at present at about 3c a bushel.

ARTILLERY INSPECTION.—The two city companies will be inspected at Victor a Park on Thursday afternoon at three o'clock, and on the following day they will perform their annual "big jim" practice at Kinloch. Lt Col Wilson, of the royal school of artillery, Quebec, will be the inspecting officer.
