Comiskey Park named Site Of Title Match Sept. 25

CHICAGO (AP)—Champion Floyd Patterson will fight Sonny Liston Tuesday, Sept. 25, before boxing fans who will pay from \$10 to \$100 to watch their heavyweight title bout in Comiskey Park.

Those major details were settled Thursday, and they were approved quickly by the Illinois Athletic Commission.

The announcement was made by Al Bolan, vice-president of Championship Sports Inc., which has the two boxers under contract, and Irving Schoonveld, Chicagoan who is acting as promoter of the match.

They told newsmen: Tickets will be priced at 100, \$50, \$30, \$20 and \$10, and all the \$7,000 seats will be sold on a reserved basis.

The net gate receipts will be split up this way: Patterson 45 per cent, Liston 12 1/2 and Championship Sports 25.

Ancillary revenues—from the closed circuit telecast and other sources—will be earmarked this way: Patterson 55 per cent, Liston 12 1/2 and Championship Sports 25.

Liston has been guaranteed a minimum of \$50,000—an amount that Bolan said is "the most any challenger ever has been guaranteed."

Bolan predicted the overall income will exceed \$5,000,000. He said his organization is asking bids for the rights to handle the closed circuit telecast to theatres and arenas across the country.

Bolan also said the fight will be carried by radio.

"I feel the fight will dwarf all other fights in history from a financial standpoint and from a performance standpoint," he said at a news conference in the office of the Illinois Athletic Commission.

HUNTERS' CORNER

The outlook for this season's crop of ducks promising at the moment. This columnist has observed a better than average number of breeding pairs of Black, Blue and Green-winged and Ring-necked ducks while on his spring and other interested wildlife observers have reported the same findings.
