Lobster Catches Reported As Fair

TIGNISH — Lobster catches in the Tignish area during the month of May were reported extremely good to fair with no records expected to be broken.

Wilson J. Shea, manager of the Tignish Fisheries Co-operative reported high boat for May averaged 9,800 lbs. with some in the 2,000 bracket.

Catches during the past few days have started to drop off and the manager expects this will continue as during the first month the bulk of the catch gets landed. The late starting date is believed to cause the lobster to become very hungry and easy to trap.

The bulk of the pack landed is processed by a day crew at the fisheries plant at Jude's Point. Market size lobsters are trucked live to the Boston Markets. The prices Mr. Shea admits is good, but no price was quoted as Tignish Fisheries pay the shuckers a fixed amount and the remainder is paid to them in rebate each year at the annual meeting in March.

The fall lobster fishermen are landing a considerable amount of cod.

The Tignish Fisheries who will be in business 40 years in September is a stopping spot for summer visitors and tourists. Mr. Shea is always ready to lead his assistants in answering their many questions on the lobster industry.

Loading Spud Cargo For West Indies Port

SUMMERSIDE — The first potato ship of the season arrived in port here last night to take on the largest cargo of the season to leave any port in the province.

The 15,000 bags of table stock consigned to Puerto Rico is being handled by Thane Ellis Limited of Summerside and Mr. Ellis said Friday morning that as a result of this export deal the market has gone up 35 cents since Thursday.

Thursday morning 75-lb. bags of potatoes were selling at \$4.50 on the Toronto market and as of 11 o'clock yesterday morning they had gone up to \$4.85 and Mr. Ellis is confident that the price will rise to \$5. per bag by the first of the week.

The Puerto Rico consignment consists of 75-pound bags.

The ship, the MV Carouca, is expected to be loaded by midnight Saturday. It is also carrying a cargo of busses for Tahiti and upon arrival here, the busses were unloaded to permit the loading of the potato cargo after which the busses will be reloaded for their original destination.

"Because of this export deal," Mr. Ellis said, "we have cleared everything available and we bought everything available off-track."

He added that in Florida new potatoes are going at \$3.50 a hundred-weight, meaning that landed in Toronto they would cost the dealers \$9.00 per hundred. "This makes our prices very competitive," he said, "and they could go up another \$1. per hundredweight and still be competitive with the prices of new potatoes."

Mr. Ellis added that his firm is receiving other export demand from the United States, in such centres as Detroit, but added he was finding difficulty to obtain potatoes of suitable quality to meet inspection at the U.S. border.

"If we could find potatoes of suitable quality we would have no problem of moving 30 to 40 cars across the border by rail," he said.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says a disturbance centred over eastern New Brunswick late Friday is predicted to move south of Cape Breton this morning, then towards Newfoundland late this afternoon and evening.

A gradual clearing and warming temperatures in the western regions are expected in the wake of this system this afternoon.
