**Giants Defeat Dodgers
8-5 To Blacken Pennant
Hopes Of Brooklyn**

The hopes of Brooklyn Dodgers of catching the flying Phils and winning the National League pennant all but flickered out last night.

The surging New York Giants, capping a 10th-inning rally with Don Mueller's two-run double, clubbed the Dodgers 8-5 and put them 7½ games behind Philadelphia, idle yesterday.

The Dodgers have only 30 games left in which to overtake the Phils, who have 25 games remaining. A pennant for the once lowly Phils would be their first in 35 years.

In the American League, the leading New York Yankees were idle, enabling Detroit Tigers to

sneak up a bit in the standings. The Tigers slammed out 16 hits as they whipped St. Louis Browns 7-4 and climbed within 1½ games of the Yankees.

Only four major league games were scheduled yesterday. In the day's other American League contest, the fourth-place Cleveland Indians kept their pennant hopes alive by edging Chicago White Sox 3-2 in 10 innings. Cleveland is in fourth place behind Boston, 4½ games off the pace.

In the National League's second night game, Stan Musial pounded out his 23rd home run of the season to give St. Louis Cardinals a 4-2 victory over Chicago Cubs.

**Art Larsen Wins U. S.
Singles Tennis Honors**

FOREST HILL, N. Y., Sept. 5—(AP)—Lefthander Art Larsen of San Francisco put on a tremendous rally today to win the United States singles tennis championship by defeating favored Herbie Flam of Beverly Hills, Calif., 6-3, 4-6, 5-7, 6-4, 6-3 before 8,000 fans.

Trailing by a set at the intermission and apparently ready to be tucked away, Larsen came roaring back to thrill the crowd with brilliant, all-court tennis in the final two sets and become the first southpaw champion in 20 years. Johnny Doeg, in 1930, was the last portside to win the title before today.

Earlier, on the wind-swept stadium court, Mrs. Margaret Osborne Dupont of Wilmington, Del., won her third straight women's singles title by subduing Doris Hart of Jacksonville, Fla., 6-3, 6-3. She also beat Miss Hart in the finals last year.

The final outcome of the men's division represented one of the greatest form upsets in years. Larsen was seeded only sixth among the American entrants in the championships and was only the sixth ranking player in the country last year. Flam, the loser, was seeded No. 2 on the home list.

Larsen, 25 years old and 140 pounds of nervous energy, was playing in only his third championship since returning from the war. Pancho Gonzales knocked him out in the quarter-finals a year ago, but there was no stopping him this time.

Flam, the 21-year-old U.S. clay court and intercollegiate champion, tried hard. After losing the opening set, he steadied, slowed down the pace against his high-strung opponent and ran off the next two in such business-like fashion that the result seemed no longer in doubt.

But Larsen, after losing the first two games of the fourth set, dug in to take the next four straight from the flustered Flam, and the rewarding roars from the crowd were all he needed. He ran himself half to death, never gave up on any point, made any number of "impossible" returns. In the end, Flam caved.

Ken McGregor of Australia and Mrs. Dupont won the mixed doubles title, defeating Frank Sedgman of Australia and Miss Hart, 6-4, 2-6, 6-3.

**Goodman Holds Fat
Margin In A. L.**

CHICAGO, Sept. 5—(AP)—Billy Goodman, Boston Red Sox' good man with the stick, holds a fat 21-point lead in the American League batting race with a .368 mark.

Although Goodman added only two points to his average last week with 11 hits in 33 AB's, he actually gained nine points on the pack.

That developed as Larry Doby of Cleveland, last week's runner-up, slumped 13 points to a third-place 341, moving Detroit's George Kell into the No. 2 spot with 347. Kell had been fourth last week with 348. Doby collected only three hits in 24 trips during the week.

New York's Hank Bauer skidded 14 points from third place to fourth with .338. Other leaders through Labor Day's play included Al Zarilla, Boston, .334; Dom DiMaggio, Boston .330; Phil Rizzuto, New York, and Walt Droppo, Boston .328 each; Paul Lehner, Philadelphia .328; and Johnny Groth, Detroit .323.

Two other Boston stars, Droppo and Vern Stephens, were co-leaders in runs-batted-in at 130 each.

Kell continued to lead in hits with 185 and in two-baggers with 42. Six of Kell's 12 blows during the week were doubles.

Cleveland's Al Rosen remained the home-run leader with an unchanged total of 33.

Best percentage pitcher with 11-win and four-loss for .733 was Detroit's Dizzy Trout. Bob Lemon of Cleveland regained the strikeout lead with a total of 141.

TORONTO, Sept. 5—(CP)—The individual scoring statistics compiled by the Canadian Press have an unfamiliar look at this early stage of the football season. Four newcomers to Canadian football—imports from the United States—head the Big Four in which each team has played two games. Behind them comes a graduate of the Intercollegiate Union. And in the Ontario Rugby Football Union, where only one game has been played, the leader comes from the intercollegiate loop.

Virgil Wagner of Montreal Alouettes, pace-setter for years, isn't even in the list.

Head man in the Big Four is Edger (Special Delivery) Jones of Hamilton Tiger-Cats who played last season with the professional Cleveland Browns. He has 16 points on two touchdowns, a field goal and three converts.

**U. S. Wins Curtis
Cup Over British**

BUFFALO, N. Y., Sept. 5—(CP)—The United States today won its fifth Curtis Cup trophy over the British Isles with a 7½-to-1½ victory in the women's international golf team matches.

The British invaders staged a valiant, late-afternoon rally but it was on heart alone. The American lead in all but one of the day's singles matches was too great to overcome.

Only Frances (Bunty) Stephens, last year's British women's champion, was able to salvage anything from the disaster. She came from behind with two beautiful putts on the 36th and 38th holes to draw with Mrs. Mark A. Porter of Westmont, N.J., the current U.S. title.

The slim English girl's effort gave her team half a point to add to the one taken in yesterday's three foursome matches.

The best British women ever have done was a tie in 1936. And for a moment today they might have repeated. For the matches most of them were closer than the final team score would indicate.

Working on their 2-to-1 lead from yesterday's foursomes, the Americans went right to work in mechanical fashion over the country club at Buffalo's 6,200-yard, par-72.

**U. S. Wins Curtis
Cup Over British**

It seemed as good as over when Polly Riley, the Western amateur champion from Fort Worth, Tex., disposed of Mrs. George Valenti of Perthshire, Scotland, 7 and 6, and blonde Beverly Hanson of Chicago, N. D., unleashed her powerful woods to batter Jean Donald of North Berwick, Scotland, 6 and 5.

Musial has carried out 170 hits, the most in the league, in 473 at bats. His 39 doubles also is a top mark.

Brooklyn's Carl Furillo is the circuit's No. 4 stickman with a .324 average. Then comes Andy Pafko of Chicago and Boston's Sid Gordon tied for fifth with .319.

Pittsburgh's Ralph Kiner, pursuing Babe Ruth's record of 60 homers, has hit 42 round trippers. Del Ennis of the Philadelphia Phillies is the No. 1 man in runs batted in with 112, seven more than Kiner. Kiner has scored the most runs, 99.

Philadelphia's Ritchie Ashburn, in 15 triples, is four ahead of Schorsch, who has 11. In that department, Boston's fleet Sam Jethroe is far in front with 30 stolen bases.

Among the pitchers, New York's Sal Maglie boasts the top percentage, .824. The righthander has won 14 games while losing three.

Warren Spahn, Boston's crafty lefthander, is first with 123 strikeouts.
