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Literature And Life

THE SANGUINE TEMPERAMENT

We may regard temperament as a sort of thermostat, by which is registered the reaction of the emotional life to certain stimulus.

We usually speak of four principal temperaments—the sanguine, the melancholy, the phlegmatic and the choleric. There are races and individuals which incarnate these. Let us look briefly at the sanguine. At the root of the word is idea of blood. Our dictionary give synonyms for this word, such as "habitually hopeful, optimistic, blood red". So that a person with this temperament will naturally look on the bright side of life.

They are usually the people who get things done. Is it not the temperament which characterizes the navigator? Did not Columbus have it when he pushed his prow into uncharted seas? Did not Lincoln have it when he took up arms to liberate the slaves? Did not David Livingstone have it when he went out to Africa? William Booth felt it when he took up the cause (apparently hopeless) of the underprivileged and the poor of the underworld of London.

Young men have been designated lately by the church to go out and "turn the world upside down". In such days as these, with the emphasis laid on material things, and the shrine of pleasure filled with devotees, it requires of these men courage and devotion if the citadels of iniquity are to fall before them.

A blind zeal will accomplish little or nothing. The Bible knows of a "zeal not according to knowledge." Years ago I heard a Christian worker say that you might as well send a child down the street with a loaded gun as to send your child to a Sunday School class whose teacher had not had a training in religious education! What about some of us who had as a teacher in Sunday School a farmer or some matriarch who had never heard of the term? The time was not spent in discussing the dress of the boys or girls, nor were they submerged with helps, but having nought but the Bible they taught us that, and so today we know that Sodom and Gomorrah are not man and wife but geographical terms. Nor would we make the mistake of saying that the poor fellow helped by an automobile.

An alternate term for sanguine is optimistic. There is a story told of Emerson and Carlyle: it seems that on one occasion Carlyle led the serene philosopher through the abominations of the streets of London at midnight, asking him with grim humour at every few steps, "Do you believe in the devil now?" Emerson replied, that the more he saw of the English people the greater and better he thought of them.

This story lays bare the limits of these great men, for where one saw, the other was blind. To one there was the misery and the mire; to the other the pure white beam was scarcely broken. Brownie was our fine optimist: "Must in death your daylight finish?"

My sun sets to rise again." In the morgue of Paris he sees tragedy—suicides—but is optimistic: "My own hope is, a sun will pierce The thickest cloud earth ever stretched; That after last, returns the first. Though a wide compass round be fetched. That what began best, can't end at worst. Nor what God blessed once, prove accursed."

So he speaks in "Apparent Failure". He puts into the mouth of his little mill girl, Pippa, these words: "God's in His heaven—All's right with the world."
