The Development.

An important step in the development of the Nile Valley has recently been taken in the formal ratifying by the Khedive of the contract for the construction of two large reservoirs on the Nile. The work is planned on a large scale and includes the construction of two great dams across the river, one at the cataract at Assuan and the other at Assiut. At Assuan the waters will be impounded by a granite dam which will be built upon the granite reefs which form the cataract. Its crest will be about 76 feet above the river bed at its deepest point and the total length of the dam will be about 6,000 feet. The difference in the water level in the wet and dry seasons will be about 45 feet. It will be pierced with sluiceways to permit the flood waters to flow through without any considerable backing up in the reservoir. In the fall of the year, when the waters have carried down their valuable burdens, of silt for the enriching of the Nile Valley the sluice gates will be shut down and the reservoir allowed to fill. The season of low water last, from April till August, and during this period the sluice gates will be opened sufficiently to keep the waters of the lower Nile at the proper level for irrigating the sugar, cotton and rice fields. It is calculated that the amount of water impounded will be sufficient to supply the lower valley until the next season's flood waters come down. If the scheme is successful, the Egyptian husbandman will be able to irrigate his fields throughout the whole year. The Assiut dam is to be built for the purpose of raising the level of the river during the summer and increasing the supply in the canals of lower Egypt. It will be built on the lines of the celebrated barrage of the Nile, which is situated just to the north of Cairo. This important work is to be completed in five years, and its effect upon the districts affected will be to enormously increase the value of the land and the property of the people.

IRVING AND BOOTH.

The English Actor's Generous Treatment of the American.
In The Century there is an article on "Edwin Booth in London," by E. H. House. In speaking of Irving's action in appearing with Booth at the Lyceum Mr. House says: "Looking at all the possibilities of the case, I hold to the opinion now, as I did then, that Irving risked more than people supposed—more, it may be, than he himself took into full reckoning. I will not further enlarge upon what might have happened to his disadvantage. As to his hope of gain, what was it? He could win approval for extending a consoling hand to a distinguished brother actor and helping him to recover some of the equanimity he had lost through untoward circumstances, he could commend himself to the good will of the American public and set up a particular claim to its cordiality in case he should visit the United States, and he could identify himself and his establishment with a Shakespearean representation of uncommon nearness to perfection. I do not see that there was anything else to his side of the account. He certainly was not so weak as to imagine he would outshine Booth and add to his own reputation at the other's expense. Pecuniary benefit was out of the question. The profits of the combination could not be larger than those of the regular Lyceum performances at ordinary prices. There might be a certain pleasure in "taking the chances" of so novel an enterprise. But Irving was not the sort of man to whom the excitement of a gambling operation would be especially alluring. There is no evidence that he was moved by a single unworthy impulse. Though the trip to America may have been in his mind, it does not follow that he was so readily influenced by expectations of a material recompense for his hospitality. I doubt indeed if he could have formed any conception in advance of the acknowledgment in store for him. Few Englishmen understand without convincing testimony how intensely responsive to a generosity the American people are. Charles Scoble knew it by intuition, as he seemed to know many other things which he had never learned by experience. Irving's knowledge came later. If he was actuated by selfishness of any kind, it was on behalf of his theater, to maintain the supremacy of which was always one of his dearest objects. An actor who is also a manager may care as much for the character of the productions at his house as for the personal elevation. Booth had once been thus inspired and had lost a fortune because he was more ambitious for the beautiful edifice he had created than for himself. To have it recorded that the most brilliant Shakespearean illustration of the day had been given under his auspices and within his own walls was doubtless worth more to Irving than any calculation of present or future remuneration—more probably than any renown he could hope to win by the impersonation of Iago, which he was preparing with diligent study. Interesting Relics.

A couple of interesting relics are in the possession of Albert Turner of 1514 York street. One of them, and that which Mr. Turner prizes probably as much as anything he owns, is a brick from the old house that stood on Water street, New Castle, Del., from 1687 until torn down in 1894, and which was the home of the Dutch governors of the three lower counties for 100 or more years. The bricks of which the old house was constructed were brought over from Holland and, like all bricks of that time, were yellow in color. The relic Mr. Turner has, and which, by the way, is one of very few in existence, is in a good state of preservation, and, barring its slightly crumbled edges, shows but few signs of its two centuries and more. The other relic is a quaint old Revolutionary sword, carried and used with deadly effect by Captain Cunda, Mrs. Turner's great-grandfather, at the famous battle of Benis Heights.—Philadelphia Inquirer.

The World's Wire Mileage.

The total miles of telegraph wire in the world have reached 4,908,921, not counting 180,440 miles of submarine cable. Were this all in one continuous line it would wrap around the equator about 193 times. The moon and earth could be connected by 20 fibres, with enough to spare to connect every country on the earth. Of the total amount Europe has 1,764,790; Asia, 310,685; Africa, 99,419; Australia, 217,479; America, 2,510,548.
