Plates Are Required For All Small Boats

The regulations provide a fine not exceeding \$100 or a jail term not exceeding two months in default of payment of the fine for boat owners operating their craft without prescribed plates or a receipt showing they have applied for plates.

Most of the visiting agriculturists were agreed that the hay or grass guide seen on the farm of George Kennedy, New Perth was the best in that class and the pasture of Wilfred Farnham and Son, Verden River, the 1961 provincial champion, was the best seen on the tour.

The New Perth farmer grows no grain on his 75 cleared acres but fills two 60-ton upright silos and one large trench silo and cuts approximately 1,500 bales of hay to feed 75 head of cattle, more than 20 of them Mature cows. He fertilizes his fields at the rate of about 500 pounds of 6-12 to the acre in addition to the manure available.
