CIVIL SERVICE PENSIONS.

BEFORE they gained office the Liberals made frequent attacks upon the Government on account of the enlarged pension list. In respect to this matter also they have failed to meet the expectations that they raised. The pension list amounted in 1896 to \$86,080; and for the current fiscal year it will amount to \$97,859,—an increase of nearly \$12,000. If the Conservatives were extravagant as to pensions Messrs. Laurier, Tarte & Company have been more extravagant.

Laurier, Tarte & Company have failed in almost every particular to do that which they led their Liberal supporters to believe they would do.

SIR WILFRID'S PRETENCE.

WHILE Sir Wilfrid Laurier was telling the people of New Glasgow, Nova Scotia, that his dearest wish was that the peoples of Canada should all be united, his chief organ in Montreal,—La Patrie—was using the language hereafter quoted, viz:

Mr. Bergeron is to hold a Conservative picnic in his county on September 25. Mr. Bergeron ought to profit by the occasion to invite Mr. Clarke Wallace, the Grand Master of the fanatics of Ontario, an ally so dear to his heart, to come and speak of war and imperialism.—La Patrie, August 18.

Sir Charles Tupper is the elected chief, "accepted and venerable," of the society of "Orangistes," and he has the same title from the Conservatives of Quebec.—La Patrie, August 21.

In the Bleu-Orange Alliance the Conservatives of Quebec have conceded everything to the Orangemen, who conceded nothing in return. Cartier made a different bargain with Sir John McDonald.—La Patrie, August 21.

All the hope of the Tory party rests at this moment in making appeals to prejudice against the French-Canadians and against the Province of Quebec in the English provinces, and particularly in Ontario.—La Patrie, August 21.

Mr. Bergeron has not yet invited Mr. Clarke Wallace to his meeting. Why does he hesitate? Bring to the Province of Quebec, the high priest of fanaticism, that the people may hear him repeat his anti-French diatribes, which he throws into the Orange lodges. Hurry, Mr. Bergeron, that our population may see what sort of allies you have.—La Patrie, August 21.

In the Province of Ontario the party directed by Mr. Clarke Wallace, by The Mail and Empire, by the News, by the Hamilton Spectator, that is to say by the allies of Mr. Bergeron and the Journal, is accusing Mr. Laurier of being French, and is calling upon the English population to shake off the French yoke. Nevertheless, Mr. Laurier is the subject of enthusiasm and honor for the Province of Quebec and the French race in America.—La Patrie, August 21.

The Tories of Manitoba are the allies of Clarke Wallace, the News, and the Mail and Empire, and are detestable fanatics. Can you, Mr. Nantel, chain your compatriots to the hordes of fanatics?—La Patrie, Aug. 20.

It is not true that Sir Charles Tupper is the chief of the Orangemen of Canada. It is true that he has repeatedly shown that he is ready to deal justly towards men of all races, creeds and denominations. But the tone and matter of the quotations here made prove that his opponents in Quebec, who are led by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, are actuated by motives other than that presented by Sir Wilfrid, when he was a guest among the Presbyterians of Pictou County.

—It is believed that whether the elections are brought on in October or January, this is Laurier's losing time.

SIR LOUIS AND THE RAILWAY MEN

THE Patriot is cackling considerably over the part—the important part—it claims Sir Louis Davies took in connection with the increase of pay recently received by the conductors, baggage-men, brakemen and yard-men of the Island railway. It says that to Sir Louis' prompt action the increase is due, and thinks that the railway men benefitted should appreciate what he has done for them.

The Patriot evidently does not attach much importance to the part played in this matter by the Brotherhood of Railway Conductors, the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen and similar organizations with which the Island railway men are connected, and which put up such a strong fight for the increase that it could not be longer withheld. It was Sir Louis who "killed the bear."

But there are other men in the railway employ—carpenters, machinists, blacksmiths, painters, boiler-makers, round-house men and laborers—who have not been helped by Sir Louis.

In April last, we believe, these men sent to Sir Louis Davies, the Patriot's idol, a schedule of the rates of pay they received, and asked that they be given an increase all around in proportion to the pay of the men in the railway shops at Moncton. But to this day the prayer of the petitioners has not been answered. The receipt of the petition they sent to Sir Louis has not, so far as we know, ever been acknowledged.

While in Opposition Sir Louis promised an increase of pay to these men. But when he obtained power, and was in a position to render them assistance, he took no notice of their claim.

His own ends were attained, and it made no difference who suffered.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Young Conservatives are reminded of the meeting to be held in the B. I. S. Hall, Kent Street, Friday 31st about 8 o'clock.

—The Liberal-Conservatives of East Queen's meet in the Benevolent Irish Society's hall on Tuesday, September 4th, to nominate a candidate for the riding. The date should be borne in mind.

—The Presbyterian Review in its last issue says sage things about the coming elections. It does not take sides, but declares every voter should vote, and vote honestly, and see that his party's candidate is "a man of pure and honorable personal character." Further, "the chief danger to our national life at the present time is from the unchecked control of the machine in the management of elections, with the corruption which it inevitably promotes."

—La Patrie, of Montreal, is owned and controlled by Mr Tarte and his sons. It was bought to be the mouthpiece of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's government with money provided by the wealthy manipulator, Mr Greenfield, of the Drummond deal. It speaks for the men in office, in the words quoted by THE EXAMINER of today. Let the people judge whether or not such words are calculated to promote that union and concord throughout Canada which Sir Wilfrid Laurier blandly told the people of Pictou County was his "dearest wish."

—Some sixty years ago, says the Philadelphia Record, six young ecclesiastics of the Roman Catholic diocese of Rose-nau in Hungary completed together their theological course in the seminary, and were together ordained priests. For sixty years they labored side by side as priests in the same diocese. On the very same day they all celebrated the diamond jubilee of their ordination. United as they had been in life they were united in death, for within the space of two months all six have died, at the respective ages of 82, 83, 88, 86, 80 and 81.
