This Mark, whose full name was John Mark, author of the second gospel, will be the subject for the entire first quarter of this year's lessons.

He was apparently a native of Jerusalem. His mother was such a Christian that Peter, after his miraculous escape from prison, went to her home immediately to tell her the good news of his deliverance (Acts 12:17).

He writes like a reporter, reporting remarks verbatim, recording gestures and movements, using specific details exactly. The major point is the evidence of confession of sins. Yet Christ had no sin to confess. His baptism was the prelude to His sacrifice for us on the cross.

Mark opens his Gospel with 112 quotations from the Old Testament, Malachi 3:1 and Isaiah 40:1-2. The fact that he introduces John by name and identifies that his work was written for those familiar with the subject matter.

Mark's Gospel is not only the briefest of the four, but the most dramatic. It omits the entire life of Christ up to the point of His ministry, opening his story with Christ's baptism; thereafter, he devotes himself almost exclusively to two periods in Christ's life—his Galilean ministry (1:14-9:50) and his passion (11:1-16:8).
