## Favorites Come Through In 4 Major Bowl Games

The favorites came through with victories in the four major bowl football games New Year's Day, and in three of the games did it in handsome fashion.

But in the fourth, the classic at Pasadena's Rose Bowl, powerful Ohio State squeaked by a fired-up Oregon team by the thin margin of a field goal instead of three touchdowns predicted by most fans. Final score was 10-7.

Tom Forrestal led his Navy team to a surprisingly easy 20-7 win over Rice University at the Cotton Bowl in Dallas, Tex., in what had been touted as the closest-matched game of the day. Navy had been rated a one-point favorite.

At Miami, an alert Oklahoma team continued its winning ways by powering past Duke University 46-21 in the Orange Bowl. And in New Orleans' Sugar Bowl, Mississippi romped to a 37-7 victory over Texas before 82,000 fans.

The four games attracted more than 332,000 fans with the largest crowd, 98,202, sitting in at the Rose Bowl. The Orange Bowl attracted 76,318 and the Cotton Bowl 75,504.

In the minor bowl competition, Louisville defeated Drake 34-20 in the Sun Bowl at El Paso, Tex., and Prairie View A and M and Texas Southern played to a 6-6 tie in the Prairie View Bowl at Houston.

Ohio State, seeking its third Rose Bowl victory, scored the first time it got the ball, driving 70 yards with quarterback Frank Kremblas making the final yard and kicking the extra point.

But the speedy Webfoots struck back in the second quarter, climaxing an 80-yard drive with Jim Shanley scoring from the five. Jack Morris kicked the extra point to tie the score. And that it the way it remained until early

in the fourth quarter when Don Sutherland kicked an Ohio State goal from the 24-yard line.

**RECORD RUN**  
In the Orange Bowl, the Sooners got under way on Dave Baker's 94-yard touchdown run after a pass interception in the first quarter. That was the longest run in the 24 years of the Orange Bowl. Thereafter the Sooners converted two Duke fumbles, a blocked punt, a wild snap from centre and another pass interception into touchdowns.

Still, the Sooners led only 21-14 going into the final quarter after Duke moved 65 yards in the second quarter and 70 in the third for touchdowns.

In the final quarter, however, the Sooners lost no time taking advantage of the breaks and rolled for four touchdowns. The one that covered the most ground in a single play came when Bennett Watts intercepted a pass on the Oklahoma 32. He raced to the Duke 30, then lateraled to Dick Carpenter, who went the rest of the way.

Duke went 85 yards for its final touchdown but it was in a lost cause.

**BROWN SPARKS REBS**  
At New Orleans, Ray Brown, a 190-pound senior scored Mississippi's first and fifth touchdowns and in between passed for the second and set up the third with a pass interception. He picked up 157 yards in 15 carries as he sparked the Rebels to their first Sugar Bowl victory after losing to Georgia Tech in 1953 and Navy in 1955.

The Rebels' fifth touchdown, strictly a Brown affair, was a classic. With the ball on Mississippi's eight, Brown stepped into the end zone as if to punt. Seeing a host of Texans rushing in on him, the quarterback took off downfield with the ball. His run

## Canadiens Defeat Bruins; Black Hawks Beat Wings

BOSTON (CP)—Montreal Canadiens ran up a 10-point National Hockey League lead Wednesday night besting Boston Bruins 4-3 in a boisterous holiday game.

Claude Provost's third-period goal, his second of the game, was the decider as the Montrealers literally fought their way to the front in an encounter where a bench-clearing donnybrook and 27 penalties almost obscured the major league debut of Bruin goalie Al Millar.

There were seven major penalties and a 10-minute misconduct to Boston's Fleming Mackell. Montreal won at 14:05 of the finale on Provost's 12-foot break-away tally. It followed an angled 100-footer by Henri Richard and pushed Canadiens' lead to 4-2.

Boston got one back at 15:29 when Real Chevrefils scored from a scramble. Bruins threatened to tie the score in the final 30 seconds when Millar left in favor of a sixth forward.

Bernie Geoffrion got Montreal's other goal and Leo Labine and Bronco Horvath scored for Boston. The first period ended tied 2-2 and the second period was dominated by the fighting.

Both teams erupted in a flurry of bone-rattling checks and Bob Armstrong and Andre Pronovost tangled on the boards and drew a major and minor each at 10:25. A scant 15 seconds later Fernie Flaman of the Bruins and Richard clashed. The ensuing brawl not only swept the benches but shifted to the wing from centre where he won second-team all-star honors last season, the goals were his 11th and 12th.

The loss kept the Wings in a fourth place tie with Toronto, while the Hawks remain in last place.

Ron Murphy got Chicago off to a lead with only 21 seconds gone in the first period.

Angie Carroll, playing his second game with the Royals, put his team ahead at 6:43 of the first period when he found an open net behind Amherst goalie Tuffy Steeves. Willie Dunn put the Royals two goals up three minutes later on an unassisted effort. Dunn skated in all alone from the left side to poke the puck past Steeves. It seemed that time stood still for everybody but Dunn on the play. The two defence-men hardly moved to stop Willie and Steeves remained almost still in his net.

Gauthro, scored the first Amherst goal to make the score read 2-1 in favor of the Royals and although both teams pressed during the final seconds of the period, no score was registered as both Roper and Steeves were great in between the pipes.

**TIE UP GAME**  
Doug Pawley scored his first goal of the night early in the second period to bring his team up even with the Royals with help from hustling Lou Kiley and Gauthro.

Both teams tried hard to break the tie all through the rest of the period, but fine defensive work by the Royals and great saves by Steeves kept the score deadlocked.
