Remanded Again, Prisoner Objects

SUMMERSIDE— In order to check the accused's past record, Henry R. Gallant of New Waterford, N.S., charged with armed robbery of the Island Telephone Company office in Summerside, Sept. 1, was further remanded for a week.
Gallant had been previously remanded to yesterday for sentencing in Summerside Police Court.
The prisoner objected to a further remand stating he had already been in jail for three weeks. Magistrate R. S. Hinton said that such a serious charge could bring three years in penitentiary and that three weeks was only a short time.
The accused maintained he had no record except for a couple of drunk charges in his home town and that he was a coal miner who had worked 16 years with the Dominion Coal Company.
He told the magistrate he had arrived in town only the day before the robbery and had come here to pick potatoes.
The Magistrate remarked he was a little early for that job.
A truck operator was fined \$5 for permitting uncovered fertilizer he was hauling to spread on town streets and two Summerside men were each fined \$20 and costs for being intoxicated in a public place.

COLLEGE PRINCIPAL
EDMONTON (CP)—Dr. George Harrison Villett, 69, principal of Alberta College here, died Monday following a heart attack.
Dr. Villett, principal of the private college since 1947, was born in Hampton, P.E.I.
Ordained in 1923, he held United Church pastorates in various Western Canada communities and was president of the conference of Alberta and chairman of the Edmonton presbytery in 1952-53.

Dairymen Visit Nova Scotia On Three-Day Tour Of Plants

A delegation of creamery managers, makers and salesmen leave this morning on a visit to dairy manufacturing plants in the province of Nova Scotia. Included in the delegation are Ange Lassen, Federal Dairy, Eton; Reg McAdam, Merrill Creamery; G. Bruce Noye, North Wiltshire Creamery; Lloyd Rogerson, Craup Creamery; Douglas Adams, Amalgamated Dairies, Summerside; and Clifford Gaudet, Amalgamated Dairies, Summerside. Accompanying the delegates are H.J. MacDonald and E.W. Adams of the dairy division, department of agriculture, Charlottetown.
The purpose of the visit is to foster good public relations among the dairymen of both provinces, to make uniform and standardize manufacturing techniques, to conserve the use and value of the latest modern dairy equipment, and foster an increase in sales of dairy products within the Maritime Provinces.
The Island delegation will be met in Amherst by officials of the Nova Scotia Dairy Division and the tour will then be under their direction. The delegates will be absent from the province about three days.
