God's law forbidding adultery stresses personal purity and the sanctity of marriage and the family unit.—Exodus 20:14. Jesus enlarged its scope to include all impurities, for inward sins are as dangerous as outward acts.—Matthew 5:27-30. Jesus so atting the consciences of the scribes and Pharisees they refused to stone the adulterous woman.—John 8:3-8. Without condoning or condemning the woman, Jesus offered her forgiveness.—John 8:9-11.

**SEVENTH COMMANDMENT**

**Triumph Over Degeneration**

Today's lesson deals with the seventh commandment, "Thou shalt not commit adultery." Direct and to the point, the law says exactly what it means—and vice-versa. It is positive and all-inclusive. It prohibits adultery, specifically, and, by implication, all other forms of licentiousness as well.

Adultery is almost as old as mankind itself; prevalent among all races, creeds and ethnic groups; easily fallen into. Because man is human and endowed with mysterious instincts—including the sex drive—which insure the preservation of the species, he sometimes yields willingly to the temptation of adultery.

Though God-given, the sex drive—like other instincts—needs direction and control. Those who use it wisely and within the limitations set by God find it a blessing; those who pervert or abuse it find it a curse. Many a family has been broken up because one of its members has not learned to control his thoughts and desires; and a world filled with sadness and tragedy becomes even more pathetic when natural instincts are abused or not used as God intended.

God's purpose in giving this commandment was two-fold: to stress the importance of personal purity to a healthy, happy, godly existence; and to safeguard the sanctity of the marriage stage and the family unit.

As it was occasionally interpreted, the law governed only man's outward sin of adultery. Jesus, however, enlarged its scope to include all its lesser forms and impurities. Arguing for a personal purity that exceeds the literalness of the commandment, Jesus pointed out that lust in any form makes a man as guilty as though he had committed the ultimate sin, for the adulterous thought leads easily to the adulterous act.

Thus, if we are to escape the inherent dangers of impurity and adultery, we must build lives that are pure in mind, thought and heart, for our inward sins are as dangerous as our outward acts.

In an environment abounding in pornographic literature, sensual movies, suggestive fashions, dirty jokes, titillating gossip, socially-accepted immorality, sex-oriented advertising, etc., this is a monumental task. But if we make our lives truly pure, such pseudo-sophistication about us cannot harm us for "unto the pure all things are pure." (Titus 1:15); and the reward is great: "Blessed are the pure in heart; for they shall see God."

The matter of the woman taken in adultery is probably the classic example of our Lord as a forgiving Lord, despising the sin, but loving the sinner. The incident itself smacks of a plot to trap Jesus, for only the adulterous woman was dragged before Him for judgment. The Scriptures do not tell us, but legend says it was a list of women—all of whom were intimates of that outraged delegation. "Thus conscience doth make cowards of us all."

Smug in their self-righteousness, the scribes and Pharisees demanded judgment. But the Master, acting as though He had not heard them, stooped and began writing upon the dusty ground. They pressed Him further. Then Jesus rose to sting their consciences and show them they were unfit to execute the law they were so eager to carry out.

"He that is without sin among you, let him first cast a stone at her."

One by one, beginning with the eldest, they slunk away, leaving Jesus and the woman alone.

Jesus asked her, "Woman, where are those thine accusers? hath no man condemned thee?"

"I answer her in the negative, and Jesus continued, "neither do I condemn thee; go, and sin no more."

Jesus was in no way sanctioning her immorality; she had obviously broken the seventh commandment and had been a justly accused. He did not exonerate her or sit in judgment upon her. He called her sin a sin, and gave her an opportunity for forgiveness by ordering her to "go and sin no more."

What did Christ write upon the ground that caused the morally-proud scribes and Pharisees to slink away? The Scriptures

according to Mosaic Law, both of the adulterous parties were to be condemned (Deuteronomy 22:22).

**Canadians Expect Pressure At Fall Tariff Discussions**

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada will be on the spot when anti-dumping measures become a prime topic this fall at the Kennedy Round of tariff negotiations in Geneva.

An informed government source says Canadian negotiators expect strong pressure for an end to the automatic provisions of Canada's 62-year-old anti-dumping duty.

The automatic clause contradicts a formal principle adopted by the major trading nations as members of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade.

The principle states anti-dumping duty should be levied only when it can be proved that domestic industry is damaged or threatened by the sale of imported goods at a price lower than the price charged in the exporting country.

**CAN MAKE LEVIES**

Canada's revenue department has the authority to make levies without proof of damage. It needs only proof that goods of a class or kind manufactured in Canada are being imported at a price lower than the price in the exporting nation "at the time and place of shipment."

The duty levied is the difference between the two prices.

The present round of GATT negotiations considers anti-dumping the most serious of several "non-tariff barriers" to international trade. The round is attempting to establish an international code on anti-dumping regulations.

Actual negotiation of terms is expected after talks resume next month.

The government source said Canada is "not really talking" about dropping its automatic provisions.

"We would have to be convinced that there were substantial benefits for Canada in what changes other countries make in anti-dumping procedures," he said.

Canada has argued from the start that its levies must be automatic because dumping from the United States must be dealt with immediately to save Canadian producers from serious harm.

Because the U.S. market is big and the Canadian market small, a relatively insignificant amount of goods dumped by a major producer could upset market conditions in Canada.

Investigations required for proof of damage in other countries can take many months. In the U.S. separate studies to provide dumping and damage can occupy two years.

A study for the Canadian American Committee several years ago concluded that Canada has not deliberately restricted trade or affected the level of protection with its anti-dumping legislation.

But the study added that no one has yet found a meaningful way to measure the height of these classic invisible barriers. You cannot, for instance, find out how many exporters have been persuaded to stay out of the Canadian market by the tough regulations.

Many factors of quantity, exchange rates, time lag and business practices enter the picture to blur price comparisons and

prompt criticism of decisions which are not subject to appeal.

Students of anti-dumping provisions say they all pose one serious risk. Relatively cheap goods, shut out as temporary and disrupting imports, might hold promise as long-term supplies at a long-term bargain—and therefore of over-all economic benefit to the economy.
