## 'Open House' At SDU Termed Huge Success

Yesterday afternoon's "Open House" at St. Dunstan's University was termed "a complete success" by Rev. Dr. Charles Cheverie, chairman of the committee responsible for its organization.

"More than 200 students attended the auditorium and enjoyed the displays which have been seen in this line, and the

visitors showed a great deal of interest in them."

The program got underway in the alumni auditorium with introductory remarks and words of welcome by Dr. Cheverie followed by a short keynote address by Rev. E. J. Roche.

The visiting students were then divided into groups and conducted on tours of the SDU campus by student representatives.

Departmental displays were set up in the auditorium, the library, and the science building, and the visitors were given an explanation of the work of each department by the professor in charge or by students assisting him. The girls were also taken on a tour of Marian College.

The students were served a lunch in the auditorium and enjoyed a concert given by the SDU band under the direction of Lieut. Charles "Bib" MacGregor.

"The students were enthusiastic," Dr. Cheverie said, "and we are already making plans for our "Open House" for next year."

Dr. Cheverie expressed the hope that students who were unable to attend the "Open House" may take advantage of opportunities to visit SDU and learn something of the programs of study offered any time they happen to be in Charlottetown.

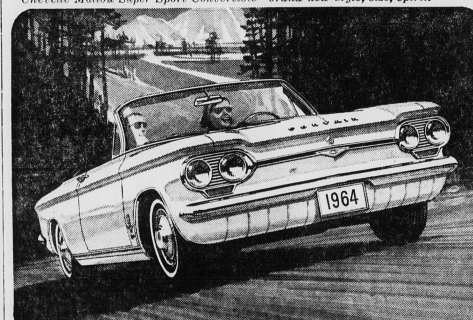

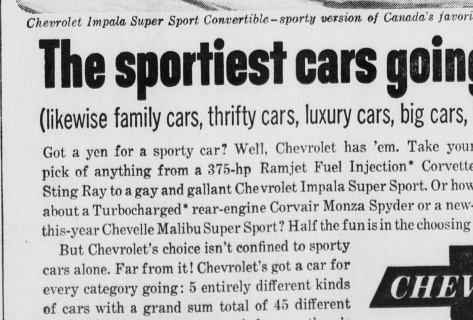

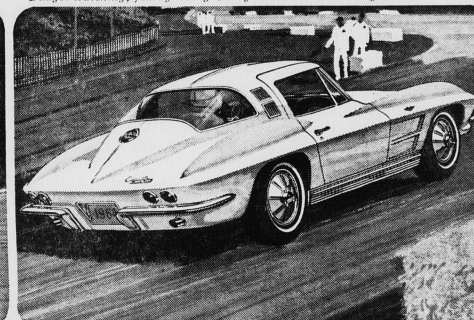
